MADE STRONGER

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 20—Asking that the Ontario temperance act be materially strengthened and improved, a large deputation from the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance yesterday afternoon waited upon Premier E. C. Drury, Attorney General Rancy and Provincial Secretary Nason. The premier said he thought it was not necessary to reassure the deputation as to the general desire of the government on the temperance question. "It certainly is not to evade the responsibility placed upon them by the force of the people in the recent referendum," he said, "and to carry out the will of the people in a manner that the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance yesterday afternoon waited upon Premier E. C. Drury, Attorney General Rancy and Provincial Secretary Nason. The premier said he thought it was not necessary to reassure the deputation as to the general desire of the government on the temperance of the strikes started during January, and there were still sixteen strikes unsettled at the end of the month.
