THE LINEN INDUSTRY ATTRACTS ATTENTION

Big American Company Formed—Ontario Now Turns Out Yarns and Fabrics

(Financial Post.) American firms are following the lead of Canada in establishing the linen industry on this continent. It is announced from Baltimore that investors are interested in plans for building a linen flax factory at Frederick, Maryland, and possibly one at Baltimore. The Fibre Company of America has been incorporated with \$1,000,000 capital to take care of the enterprise.

A United States Consular report referring to Ontario's leadership in the development of a self-contained linen industry says:

"There seems little reason why flax production and spinning, with the complementary industry of linen weaving, should not become one of Canada's important industries."

"With the installation of modern web-spinning machinery completed, a firm at Guelph, Ontario, is now turning out web-spun linen yarns from flax grown in that province. A flax spinning mill, operating in conjunction with the linen mill, makes this industry a self-contained one able to turn out linen fabrics, including the finer grades, from raw flax to finished goods. During the war the plant was running on cotton and union goods, because of the difficulty of getting flax yarn, but with a steady supply of Canadian spun-linen yarn now assured, it is turning out a full line of the finer linen goods, as well as the coarse toweling, butchers' linen, etc."

"The development of flax spinning will have a stimulating effect on the growing

WAS LIFE LONG FRIEND OF COL. ROOSEVELT

Deadwood, S. D., Sept. 25.—Seth Bullock, lifelong friend of Theodore Roosevelt, died at his home here, after an illness of several weeks. He was a pioneer of the Black Hills and was sixty-two years old.

Seth Bullock was well known as a cowboy, and in the parade at the inauguration of President Roosevelt in March, 1905, he led the cowboy contingent. At that time he was chief forest ranger in the Black Hills district, and was a valued employee of the interior department.

He was the first marshal of Deadwood and was reputed to be as handy with his gun as with his speech. Forty years ago he maintained order in Deadwood when it was thought impossible to keep "bad men" down.

When Mr. Roosevelt campaigned in the Black Hills in 1900 Bullock heard that there would be an attempt to interrupt the speaker. He sat on the platform with a six-shooter in his hand, and Mr. Roosevelt was listened to with breathless interest.

In 1906, when all the United States prisoners in the various state prisons were transferred to the federal penitentiaries and Seth Bullock, the Deadwood sheriff, had to oversee the transfer of prisoners from Sioux Falls to Leavenworth, Kan., he related the following incident to prove his ability to save life by mental science:

"I saved an Indian's life by mental science and it was the most startling event of the transfer. The Indian, who was serving a three-year term for beating his wife, was named Charley-Keeps-Close-to-Town. He believed that he was dying soon after we started from Sioux Falls, and curled up on the wagon seat and began to sing his death song. When an Indian does that he's done for as a general thing."

"I was in a terrible fix. It was bad enough to take care of him alive, but if he died, for we just didn't have anything to put him in, and it would have meant that the marshal would have had a large Indian corpse on his hands all the way to Leavenworth."

"So I went to Charley and so forth and told him that if he lived until we got to Atchison I would buy him a quart of whiskey. If he died, I told him, I would not give him a drop. Charley straightened himself up, stopped his song, gritted his teeth, and lived. He got his whiskey—and lived."

Seth Bullock was reappointed United States marshal of South Dakota in 1909. From the time he learned how to shoot in Deadwood, Bullock had been a typical
