The Trot. 2:30 to 1:58-12 in Sixty-Seven Years. It was not so many years ago that there were more persons among those interested in harness racing who believed that no trotter would ever appear that would trot a mile below two minutes than there were who believed that such a feat would be performed.

For the first time since 1853 the legitimate trotting record is now faster than the pacing record. When Maud S. trotted in 3:10 1/4 at Rochester, on August 11, 1853, the best time on record for paces was 2:12 1/4, made by Sleepy Tom. Johnson set the pacing record at 2:10 in 1883, and for twenty-two years the lateral gaited horse held the harness record, wind-aid performance and those made with running mate not considered.

Alberta, 2:03 3/4, the fastest pacer of the season, on the Pacific coast, weighed only 688 pounds. George Hage, who trains the little son of Searchlight, has been putting him in a crate and shipping him as a pony to save expense under the classification of express matter.

Noted Trainer Dead. Horace W. Brown, who died under an operation a few days ago, was a trainer of international prominence in the trotting horse world, having been among the first prominent American drivers to go to Europe. For almost twenty-five years he was the leading trainer in Vienna, the head center of harness racing on the other side of the Atlantic.
