

It is alleged that the waste from the Iron mines is very injurious to the salmon in the river, and has already caused considerable damage in this way. Luke Bouchey, Hon. Chas. E. Dak, and Wm. Heughey were examined yesterday, and the hearing was adjourned until II o'clock this morning.
