

OTTAWA, May 29—The birthrate in Canada, with the exception of Que-bec, continued its downward trend, ac-cording to the Bureau of Statistics, the cording to the Bureau of Statistics, the rate for the registration area in 1924, which includes all provinces except Quebec, was 23.1 per thousand. In 1928 it was 23.7 per thousand; in 1922, 25.1. All provinces in the registration area but one showed a decrease in 1924, as compared with the previous year. Ontario remained unchanged at 28.2 per thousand.
