Two editors, Tarte of Le Canadien, and Stewart, of the Montreal Gazette, were struck by lightning at Quebec last week. The lightning bolt must be put under restraint.

In accordance with the recent decision of the cotton companies of Canada to close all factories for six weeks, the Montreal cotton factory suspended operations last Wednesday.

On Saturday last Nathan Squiers, a lobster fisherman from the factory, at Cape Tormentine, while attending to his traps was struck by a squall; his boat capsized and he was drowned.

One morning last week two fishermen from Mr. John McFarlane's fishery brought ashore at Richibucto, eighty cod, which they had caught during the time they were overhauling their traps.

Miss Aimee Huntington who has been assistant editor of the Pictou News for over a year and a half, has accepted a similar position in the office of the Windsor Journal. Miss Huntington is a daughter of late Richard Huntington, publisher for many years the publisher of the Yarmouth Tribune.

Mr. Alfred Young of Belleisle, N. S., who is now in his 87th year, has just completed the framing of a barn for parties in that district, which on being raised proved that not a single mistake had been made in mortar or trowel. It went together like a charm, and would reflect credit on a much younger man.

The Spencer Island Shipbuilding company is now building at their famous yard a magnificent ship of the following dimensions: 222 feet keel, 45 feet beam and 24 foot. Amasa Loomer, of the firm, is master builder, and takes great pride in this ship. She will carry about 500 tons and will be launched sometime in August.

Gold was discovered some three years but not in sufficient paying quantities to warrant investment, but during the past week or two, the Messrs Reinhardt have opened up a paying lead, which is richly suited with the precious metals. Their claim consists of 40 acres, and they have applied for 80 more.

A ten-year-old son of Mr. P. Cadigan, Chockish, Kingston, Kent Co., was lost in the woods last Thursday while searching for cows. He was nearly exhausted when found the next morning at five o'clock, it having rained nearly all night. He had milked one of the cows in a bark dish, which doubtless enabled him to withstand the exposure.

Mr. D. S. Harper, of Shediac has probably the finest fruit orchard in Westmorland. It covers 24 acres under apple, plum, pear, gooseberries, raspberries and currants. He has now growing and in a thrifty condition, 500 apple trees and 30 plum trees 16 feet apart each way. He will have growing and in a vigorous state several pear grafts upon mountain ash trees.

Tuesday's Charlottetown Patriot says a correspondent who was in the country yesterday near an elderly lady, nearly 80 years of age, who told him, that in 1815 she was in Charlottetown, and saw noted up in conspicuous places, a notice issued by the authorities calling upon the citizens to offer up thanks to Almighty God, for the capture and transportation to St. Helena of Napoleon Bonaparte.
