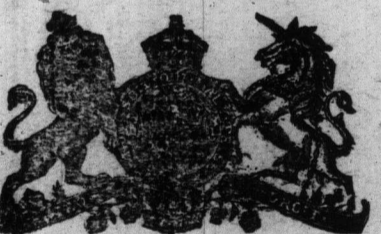

One of the Objections

Yesterday we reported that the liquor interests had retained Mr. M. W. Furlong, K. C., to attack before the Supreme Court the validity of the Prohibition Act passed at the last session. We hear that he will also submit to that tribunal various reasons which the liquor interests indicate will justify cancelling the vote just taken. One of the most important of these is that a circular of instructions signed by Mr. A. A. Parsons, Superintendent of the Penitentiary, in his capacity as Secretary of the Prohibition Committee, and apparently sent, amongst others, to the returning officers in the outport Districts, was seemingly regarded by these gentlemen as being official documents and were actually retained by them to the Colonial Secretary's Department in St. John's, included among the official documents which they have to return here with the various papers and forms after an election takes place. -Herald, Nov. 27.

NEWS IN A LINE

The Colonial Chemical Co. has gone into voluntary liquidation.

The Legislature is further prorogued until Dec. 29th next.

Mr. Stephen Mercer, who was attending the F. P. U. Convention, returned home Saturday night.

The experience of the Blanche M. Rose shows that suitable steamers should have been sent out from St. John's on Wednesday, the day following the big gale, to search for missing or disabled schooners.

The Salvation Army in Canada is raising money to purchase a number of Red Cross motor ambulances. We notice that Ensign Harry Hurd has been very successful at Halifax, having raised enough money to purchase one ambulance.

The liquor sellers are fighting a hopeless case. Nearly 25,000 people have said "Yes, we want the Prohibition Act put in force," and it's got to be done or they will know the reason why. We are fighting for the Right, and we've got to win.

The steamer Daelm, from Sydney to Manchester with a load of steel products, is out over 40 days, and grave fears are expressed for her safety. Capt. Baxter Harbour, of Wesleyville, was in charge.

All the steamers of the Ventures class have been sold to the Russian Government. The Russians intend keeping Archangel open at all costs.

The Bay Roberts Prohibition Campaign Committee will meet in the Empire Hall Thursday night, Dec. 9th, at 8 o'clock.

A young man named Bennett Carnoche, of Lunenburg school, or Mary D. Young, was drowned on Monday night in the harbor of St. John's. It is said he was under the influence of liquor at the time. If so, one more life has been snuffed out by the awful curse. The people of this country are aroused as they never were before about the liquor traffic, and if the Prohibition Act is "monkeyed" with we believe there will be a revolution.

The man Coombes, of Island Cove, who was killed recently at Bell Island, left a wife and a large family. We presume an investigation was held, but if so the results have not been published. Life appears to be very cheap nowadays and we all go on our way largely indifferent to the cries, the woes and the wails of the widows and orphans who are usually unable to fight for their rights. When are the Christian churches and people going to arise and demand a better system? When will affliction or sorrow come to our own homes we feel it deeply. We should also weep with others, especially the helpless ones, and we that are able should bear their burdens and endeavor to fight their battles. Shall we do it?

Prohibitionists would do well to swallow with a grain of salt anything in favor of Prohibition published by a newspaper carrying liquor advertising. Look through your favorite paper and see if it carries any.
