COBALT CAMP.  
Ore in Sight is Worth Millions of Dol-  
lars—Only a Few Vens Un-  
covered.

Ottawa, Jan. 17.—A. P. Vena, director  
of the geological survey, in the immu-  
nary report of the department pre-  
sented to parliament, says that he paid  
a short visit to Cobalt. He adds: "Of  
course on so short a visit it would be  
presumptuous to offer an opinion upon  
the origin and extent of the ore.  
Enough was seen to pronounce upon  
the richness of the veins and to make  
a rough estimate of the millions of dol-  
lars in silver shown on the surface  
and in the workings of the claims.  
Granting only very moderate depth,  
there is ore in sight sufficient to pro-  
duce millions, and only a few of the  
veins have as yet been uncovered."

Attention is also called to the limited  
area covered by the veins in this region  
and to the natural impulse to consider  
locations in the vicinity of great value.  
Prices are being advanced in many in-  
stances beyond reason.

SECRETARY ROOT ARRIVES.  
Ottawa, Jan. 19.—Secretary of State  
Root arrived from Washington this  
afternoon and drove straight to Gov-  
ernment House.

GOOD SHOWING

ADMIRALTY ISSUES  
RESULTS OF GUN LAYING

Pacific Coast Sloop Headed Vessels  
Firing With Four Inch  
Guns.

Special correspondence from London  
states that the Admiralty return giving  
the results of the gun layers' test in  
1906 has just been published. It is pre-  
sented by the Admiralty, stating that the  
results of the Admiralty note with ex-  
treme satisfaction the very marked im-  
provement. In the results as compared  
with former years, including even those of  
1905, when the shooting showed such a  
great advance over previous results. This  
improvement is due to a higher standard  
generally throughout the fleet. This year  
89 ships fired, and the percentage of hits  
to rounds fired was 11.5, as compared  
with 6.55 in 1905, 6.36 in 1904, 6.04 in 1903,  
4.11 in 1902, 3.63 in 1901, 3.23 in 1900, 3.11  
in 1899, 31.63 in 1898, and 31.86 in 1897.

The Pacific Coast Advertising Men's
