EDITORIAL

BUY CANADIAN GOODS

Several Canadian newspapers have recently published an advertisement of the Department of Trade and Commerce of Canada in the form of a letter from the Minister to "Christmas Shoppers Everywhere in Canada", which contains interesting information and valuable suggestions as to the relief of unemployment in Canada.

According to this letter it is conservatively estimated that Canadians spend over \$75,000,000.00 per year on things to be given away, of which \$50,000,000.00 is spent for Christmas gifts.

If the amount were spent for goods manufactured in Canada it is sufficient to give steady employment to 10,000 men for one year.

The plea, therefore, is made to restrict Christmas purchases to goods produced in Canada so that in addition to bringing joy to the recipients of the gifts employment will be given to some Canadian.

This plea is a sound one and should be accepted, first nationally, secondly provincially and thirdly locally. In our Christmas and general buying if we were to give away, of which \$50,000,000.00 is spent for Christmas gifts.
