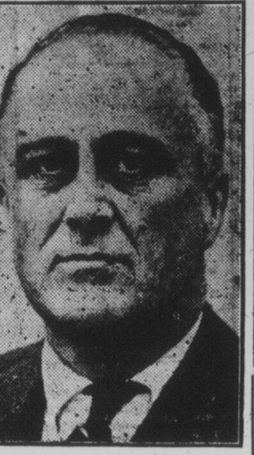
Mr. Ralph Harris of Fort Kent was best man while Miss Katharine Hector of Fort Kent was bridesmaid.

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CANCER LARGELY PREVENTABLE IN PEOPLE INFORMED

"The cure of cancer at the present time is not a drug, nor a serum, nor a ray, nor a miracle, but simply the education of the people as to the signs of its beginning in local lesions, and the importance of an immediate examination which will lead to recognition and treatment in the most favorable stage for a cure."

CANCER OF THE SKIN

This is the second of a series of articles dealing with Cancer. The distribution of these articles in this Province has been approved by the Provincial Department of Health.

No one properly informed should die of cancer of the skin. Beautiful women never die of cancer of the skin, except when it is situated on the bridge of the nose due to the irritation of their vanity never-slip eye-glasses.

Beautiful women and everyone who pays attention to the looks of the exposed part of the face observe at once the pigmented mole of the wart or the area of irritation of the skin, or the sore spot, and when they seek an immediate examination and treatment they are absolutely protected from cancer.

This information is pretty widespread among all groups of people today. Cancer on the bridge of the nose due to the neglect of the irritation by the vanity glass has practically disappeared, because people, doctors, oculists and opticians now know the dangers and the moment an irritation appears the type of frame is changed.

The majority are beginning to learn that one should neglect any irritation of the skin anywhere. The first appearance of a scaly area called an area of keratosis, whether it weeps or not, whether it is painful or not, should be washed three or four times a day with warm water soap, using cotton, followed by medicated alcohol and then covered with a little vaseline two per cent, yellow oxide of mercury ointment.

An irritation from the bite of an insect should be at once washed in alcohol and covered with collodion. The most simple remedy for itching is to use collodion. When the armies of the medical profession have instructed the soldier on the protective use of the feet, it is more important today to reach the people about the proper care of the skin on any part of the body for protection against cancer than it was to instruct the soldier about his feet.

When the family physician is selected before illness comes, you can learn from him the simple care of the skin at the periodic examination and show him any skin defects that may have been present since birth or appeared recently.

The properly trained family physician will know when the skin defect should be referred to a dermatologist, or a surgeon for further diagnosis and treatment.

Seventy years ago the most common form of cancer of the skin was among chimney-sweeps due to their occupation and their ignorance of cleanliness. This form of cancer of the skin has disappeared, because the occupation has disappeared. There is evidence that all forms of cancer of the skin will disappear when the people and the medical profession learn and practice the care of the skin just as cancer of the mouth will disappear when people learn and practice the care of the mouth and teeth.
