Not much can have happened since the previous Newfoundland election to chauge the opinion of the people respecting the parties or their lealers. Neither has had opportunity to introduce legislation, or to perform more than the routine work of admigistration. The Morris ministry, which took office when Sir Robert Bond found that he could not control an evenly divided House, seems to have regarded itself as a provisional administration. Substantially it existed by the personal authority of the Governor. The dissolution of the Legislature was the one proceeding open to the political controversy. Sir Robert Bond resented this course. He seems to have taken the ground that if the dead-lock made a dissolution necessary, it should have taken place without a have taken the ground that if the dead-lock made a dis-solution necessary, it should have taken place without a previous change of Government.
