discase known as purpura hemorrhagica.

Mr. Porteous was 57 years old and had been a resident of Minneapolis for 26 years. About two years ago he moved to Wayzata and had lived there since. He is survived by his wife and a sister, Mrs. Hugh H. McLean, wife of Col. Hugh H. McLean, of St. John, New Brunswick. Colonel McLean is a member of the Canadian parliament.

Was Born in Canada.

Mr. Porteous was born in Canada agendember 7, 1856, and for several sears before coming to Minneapolis was connected with the lumbering rade in that country and later in the Work. He came from New York of Minneapolis, entering the employ of S. G. Cook & Company, builders of the Lamber Exchange building. After the disbanding of the company he became interested in the real estate and banking business and became secretary and treasurer of the Lumber Exchange eight years ago.

He was a member of the Real Estate Board. He was president of the foung Men's Christian Association or eight years and for several years was one of the officers of Westminster church. He was a member of the Minneapolis and Lafavette Clubs.

"Although I do not know just what I shall do, until I get my formal instructions from the government, I rather anticipate that I shall start my studies and observations among the Apaches and Navahoes of the southwest, as these tribes have the richest store of music. Also, I know a man out there, an Indian trader, named Hubbell, who is perhaps the greatest living authority on Indian lore in the West, and I think I can get a great deal of help from him in starting my work. But, of course, I shall have to travel a great deal from one reservation to another and to the different schools. It will be a work of years, not of months. I don't want merely to scratch the service. There is a wonderfully important work to be done, if it is done thoroughly.

"As a vocalist, the Indian has remarkable powers, you know, His voice has a trogmendous range, from the deepest plote up to falsetto such as McCormick sometimes uses, only in the case of the Indian he can sing a whole song in this falsetto. They are very impressive in their rendition of their own music, and I am sure that I shall find much of interest to the public as well as to musicians and ethnologists."

O'Hara is one of the younger, popular composers. He is a nephew of Theodore O'Hara, who wrote "The Bivouac of the Dead," and a descendant of that Ges. O'Hara, who surrendered the sword of Cornwallis to Washington at the taking of Yorktown. A Canadian by birth, O'Hara is a self-taught man, so far as his musical education is concerned. One of his biggest hits "Time Has Brought No Changes to my heart," sung by Lew Dockstader, sold 200,000 copies, and his latest song, "Your Eyes Have Told Me." Is to be sung by Caruso in English.
