Greedy Birds Get Caught in Weir at Welchpool, Campobello.

More gulls have been in the lower bay during the past week than at any time this fall and this is a sign of plenty of small herring. More than a hundred gulls were drowned, or smothered, a few days ago in a strange manner at one of the large brush fish weirs just off Welchpool, Campobello Island, and large numbers of the gulls, called to the fish weir by the small herring swimming near the top of the water, blocked up the top of the brush and marline enclosure and were smothered, then dropped into the water and were drowned, and fishermen gtate that this has happened at previous times when herring were in weirs walting to be removed by the fishermen.
