COULD NOT STOP MARITIME BOARD OF TRADE IN SESSION IN MONCTON NOW

Until She Tried "Fruit-a-tives"
—Made From Fruit Juices

Hopes of Unanimous Agreement in the Conference, So
Called in Opening Day, Has Failed.

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 17.—Hopes of unanimous agreement in the National Industrial Conference, so high and confident in the early hours of its deliberations, rapidly faded today. There are three outstanding questions:

(1) Universal acceptance of the eight-hour day or the forty-four hour week;

(2) Recognition of organized labor and collective bargaining; and

(3) The right to gain by acceptance of all three propositions, and naturally its delegates are fighting hard to achieve them, and on the other hand, they involve concessions by the employers, and with the exception of partial acceptance of the minimum wage, are opposing them with all their strength.

The result is that unless some entirely unexpected light dawns upon the conference tomorrow it is almost certain to fail in respect of the three most vital issues with which it was charged.

The opposition of the employers to the eight-hour day was unanimous, clear-cut and emphatic. They objected to the eight-hour day on the ground that it would subject Canadian industry to unfair competition with foreign countries where long hours of labor are common.

Their opposed recognition of labor unions by the argument that they could not surrender the principle of the open shop and that moreover there were several kinds of unions with conflicting aims and demands.

The third question involved the fact that the principle would be applied to women and children, but held that the general question should be left over until the meeting of the International Labor Conference at Washington. The discussion today was in a much more militant and controversial
