What an escape we had! Five officers came in, all having escaped in a wonderful manner—three naked having had to swim the Ganges. We were all night under arms, and in the morning lay down on our cots...

When we could, once got out of the fort we were all over the place, cutting down all natives who showed any signs of opposition; we enjoyed these trips very much, so pleasant it was to get out of that horrid fort for a few hours.

The wicked 6th had marched out on the 7th, leaving two guns, and a Mussulman had set himself up in the city calling himself the agent of the King of Delhi...

At last, when reinforcements came up, we all marched out, drove the insurgents out of the city, took possession of it and the station, where we have remained ever since in the Collector's house—about 20 of us; others are in the pucks (brick-built) houses that were not burnt; and the Fusiliers and 89th (Queen's) in the church.

I have been appointed chief of a commission for the trial of all natives charged with offences against Government and persons; day by day we have strung up eight and ten men. We have the power of life and death in our hands, and I assure you we spare not. A very summary trial is all that takes place; the condemned culprit is placed under a tree with a rope round his neck on the top of a carriage, and when it is pulled away off he swings.
