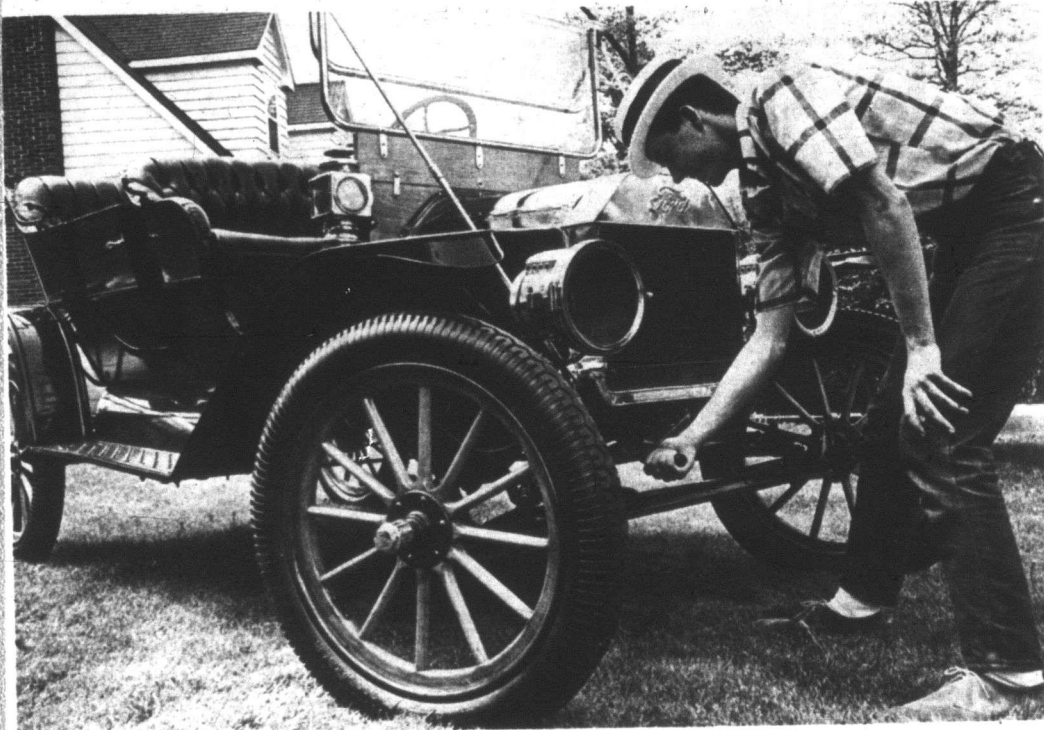

ORENDA DISPUTE:

Machinists end strike

Things are back to normal and "running smoothly" at the Orenda Limited plant in Malton, following a one-day wildcat strike which closed the plant down last week.

Over 1,000 workers were affected.

The 24-hour walkout was called by members of Lodge 717 of the International Association of Machinists

and Aerospace Workers when four workers were suspended for refusing to work overtime.

Paul Nielsen, Orenda's personnel manager, said the inspectors were suspended for a day for consistently refusing to work overtime.

The men had been warned that refusals would be met with suspensions, he said.

Union business representative George Drennan said the company had no right to require the men to do overtime.

He said the members felt the company was violating the collective agreement by suspending the men and violating the Employment Standards Act of Ontario.

A union spokesman said the IAMAW had placed a ban on all overtime work because of layoffs four weeks ago.

A company spokesman said, Monday, that things were back to normal at the plant.

Bus service bad

STREETSVILLE - A delegation from the Streetsville Women's Institute spoke to council Monday on the poor transportation system to and from Streetsville.

In a prepared resolution, Miss Hoople on behalf of Mrs. Norm Cook and Mrs. Freed Maas said transportation was poor from Streetsville to Toronto and there is no transportation to Streetsville on Sunday.

Mayor Jack Graham understood the problem. He said he was aware of the seriousness and certainly worthy of consideration.

He suggested the delegates consult regional authorities as it is a regional problem. The resolution was referred to Committee I for study.

Centre sees rapid growth

Streetsville has been asked for a \$4,000 donation to the growth of the Adult Training Centre and Workshop for the mentally retarded.

The workshop serves Mississauga, Streetsville and Port Credit and is located on the Base Line, Meadowvale, west of Highway 10.

Representing the workshop at council Monday was Tommy Dale, chairman of the Adult Services Committee of the Association for the Mentally Retarded of South Peel and Bert Mumby, vice-chairman.

"As of May 1, our attendance is 30 and is expected to increase to an additional 40 in the next

three years. We are presently operating with inadequate facilities and areas," explained Mr. Dale.

A report Mr. Dale submitted to council, outlined the reasons for the expansion: The increase in population in Mississauga, Streetsville and Port Credit; the students presently attending the Red Oaks School will soon be 18 years of age and will go on to the Adult Training Centre; there are some students who are presently attending both Britannia and Port Credit Vocational Schools, who are expected to be attending the Workshop.

Shots prevent sheer madness

A rabies clinic will be held for the third year in a row at the Mississauga Municipal building June 7, 1969.

The clinic, arranged by the towns of Mississauga, Port Credit and Streetsville, and the Mississauga Academy of Veterinary Medicine, will run from 2:30 p.m. to 4 p.m.

According to a spokesman

for the clinic, about 1500 pets are expected to be vaccinated, compared with 800 last year, and 350 in 1967.

Only dogs and cats will be vaccinated at the clinic, and the fee will be \$1 to residents of a participating municipality and \$3 to others.

Rabies certificates will not be issued.

New expropriation laws introduced

Justice Minister John Turner last week introduced a bill of expropriation in the House of Commons, designed to give property owners a new chance in lighting expropriation orders.

The bill is a direct result of Hyliard Chappell's maiden

speech in the House last September when he attacked the existing "outmoded" legislation.

Mr. Chappell, Peel South's MP, who won his seat by a slim majority over Tory contender Earl Brownridge at the last federal

election, has long been campaigning for a better deal for homeowners involved with expropriation orders.

The bill, which is not expected to be dealt with until after the summer recess, is expected to bring federal expropriation prac-

tise into line with revisions made in Ontario legislation.

One of the bill's major proposals is expected to be an order that federal expropriation authorities

Property owners must also be given proper notification of expropriation before it takes place while at the moment some owners have not known of the move until after their homes had been expropriated.

Mr. Chappell, a well-known local lawyer, pledged he would do all he could to aid homeowners.

At a recent local conference at Huron Park he said, too, he would press for housing reform and

suggested the allowing of smaller lots for housing, as small as 20 feet across.

Preparations for the annual Mississauga Day Picnic are well under way by the town Recreation Committee and Community Centres Board.

Budget approval has been given by Mississauga council for the event to be held at Huron Park, June 14.
