He said the members felt the company was violating the collective agreement by suspending the men and violating the Employment Standards Act of Ontario.


A union spokesman said the IAMAW had placed a ban on all overtime work because of layoffs four weeks ago.

### Shots prevent sheer madness

A rabies clinic will be held for the third year in a row at the Mississauga Municipal building June 7.

The clinic, arranged by the towns of Mississauga. Port Credit and Streetsville. and the Mississauga Academy of Veterinary Medicine, will run from 2:30 p.m. to 4 p.m.

According to a spokesman

for the clinic, about 1500 pets are expected to be vaccinated, compared with 800 last year, and 350 in 1967

Only dogs and cats will be vaccinated at the clinic. and the fee will be \$1 to residents of a participating municipality and \$3 to

Justice Minister John Turner last week introduced a bill of expropriation in the House of Commons, designed to give property owners a new chance in lighting expropriation orders.

The bill is a direct result of Hyliard Chappell's maid-

en speech in the House September when he attacked the existing "outmoded" legislation.

Mr. Chappell, Peel South's MP. who won his seat by a slim majority over Tory contender Earl Brownridge at the last federal election, has long been campaigning for a better deal for homeowners involved with expropriation orders
