Our conception of the State has
broadened from that of the Sity State of ancient days. But
that has not changed the nature of politics. It has only
served to widen their scope and their absorbing interest.
The point I want to emphasize at the moment is that politics
is inseparable from citizenship, and citizenship inseparable
from service, and service inseparable from the highest and
fullest expression of our natures. Keep this thought in mind
and you will have a true appreciation of how noble a thing it
is to be concerned with politics, and inversely how ignoble
is the attitude of those who regard politics as something
which is no concern of theirs.

Comparison of Politics to-day with Politics in the Days of the Ancients

The next thought I should like to present to you is the significance of politics in our day; and of having to do with politics in our day in comparison with politics and with participation in politics in the days of the Ancient Greeks. In other words, and in order to link what I have to say with the immediate purpose of the association which has been launched here this evening, the difference between the significance of politics in the century before Christ and politics in the Twentieth century.

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
