7 And as ye go, preach, saying, The kingdom of heaven is at hand.

8 Heal the sick, cleanse the lepers, raise the dead, cast out devils: freely ye have received, freely give.

9 Provide neither gold, nor silver, nor brass in our purses.

10 Nor scrip for your journey, neither two coats, neither shoes, nor yet staves: for the workman is worthy of his meat.

11 And into whatsoever city or town ye shall enter, enquire who in it is worthy; and there abide till ye

go thence.

12 And when ye come into an house, salute it.
13 And if the house be worthy, let your peace come upon it: but if it be not worthy, let your peace

return to you.

14 And whosoever shall not receive you, nor hear your words, when ye depart out of that house or city, shake off the dust of your feet.

15 Verily I say unto you, It shall be more tolerable for the land of Sod'om and Gomor'rha in the day of judgment, than for that city.

THE LESSON RETOLD

As Jesus went about through the land, teaching the people and healing their diseases, His heart was filled with sorrow, for they seemed to have no strong leaders among them, and no faithful teachers to tell them the things of God and His kingdom.

So Jesus called His twelve disciples to Him, that He might send them out to preach the gospel and to heal diseases. Now the names of the twelve apostles were, Simon Peter, and his brother Andrew, James and John, the sons of Zebedee, Philip and Bartholomew, Thomas and Matthew, James the son of Alphæus and Lebbæus, Simon the Canaanite, and Judas Iscariot, who afterwards betrayed Him. These twelve the Master sent forth as the first missionaries, to do His work, and before they went, He told them what they were to do.

"On this journey", He said, "you are not to go to the Gentiles or the Samaritans, but only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. And as you go, warn them that the kingdom of heaven is at hand, and that Christ has come to save all that believe in Him. You shall be given power to heal the sick, to make the lepers well and to raise the dead. Give freely of all that has been so freely given to you."

Jesus also told His disciples not to take money or food with them for their journey. All they needed would be provided for them, because they were doing His work. When they entered a city or town, they were to
