THE CANADIAN NORTH-WEST

HOMESTEAD **REGULATIONS.**

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, excepting 8 and 26, which has not been homesteaded, or re-served to provide wood lots for settlers, or for other purposes, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one quarter section, of too acres, more or less. **BUTRY.**

Entry may be made personally at the local land office or the district in which the land is situate.

HOMESTEAD DUTIES. A settle, who has been granted an entry for a uomestead is required by the provisions of the Do-mnion Lands Act and the amendments therete to perform the conditions connected therewith, under one of the fo¹ wing plans :-

(v) At least six months' residence upon and culti-vation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is de-(2) II the tather (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If a settler was entitled to and has obtained entry for a second homestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by residence upon the first home-stead, if the second homestead is in the vicinity on the first homestead.

(*) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements of this Act as to resi-dence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

The term "vicinity" used above is meant to indicate the same town, township or an adjoining or cornering township.

A settles who avails himself of the provisions of Clauses (2), (3) or (4) must cultivate 30 acres of his homestead, or substitute 20 head of stock, with build-ings for their accommodation, and have besides 80 acres substantially forced substantially fenced.

The privilege of a second entry is restricted by law to those settlers only who completed the duties upon their first homesteads to entitle them to patent on or before the and June, 1889.

Every homesteader who fails to comply with the requirements of the homestead law is liable to have his entry cancelled, and the land may be again thrown open for entry.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT

should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent, or the Homestead in sector. Before making application for patent, the settler must give six months' notice in writing to be Commissioner of Dominion Lands, at Ottawa. f. stention to do so.

Aveny, arrived immigrants will receive at the Immi-gration Office in Winnipeg or at any Dominion Lands Office in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, information as to the lands that are open for entry, and from the officers in charge, free of expense. ad-vice and assistance in securing land to suit them, Full information respecting the land, timber. coal and mineral laws, as well as respecting Dominion Lands in the Railway Belt in British Columbia, may be obtained upon application to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commis-sioner o. Immigration, Winnipeg, Manitoba, or to any of the Dominion Land Agents in Manitoba or be North-West Territories.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

A NY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba. Saskatchewan and Alberta, ex-cepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.


Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate, The homesteader is required to perform the con-ditions connected therewith under one of the follow. ing plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence up-on farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
