The Le Roi. The Le Roi's new smelter at North port was blown in on Friday and work started very smoothly. It is the intention of the Le Roi people to treat the entire output of the mine at the new plant. James Breen is the manager of the smelter, and H. C. Bellinger is superin- about 200 feet. tendent. body of low grade ore. The Sunset No. 2. The main tunnel in the Sunset No. 2 is now in 170 feet beyond the No. 1 shaft and is in four feet of good ore. Since October 5, 1898, the amount of work done on this property amounts to a total measurement of 539 feet. This consists of upraises 62 feet, tunneling 362 feet, and crosscuts 25 feet, while the No. 1 shaft has been extended 35 feet below the tunnel level and the No. 3 shaft has been deepened 55 feet. Everything is working very smoothly at the mine.

The Velvet. Arrangements have been made to commence shipments from the Velvet and the first consignment of ore will be rawhided out early this week. A contract has been let for the packing out of some 600 tons of ore. The shaft continues to be deepened, and discloses excellent copper ore, as is also the case with the drifts at the 100-foot level.

The Good Hope. The shaft has now attained a depth of 25 feet. This work is being carried on night and day and will be continued till a depth of 65 feet is reached when another contract for further deepening the shaft will be let. There is a two foot ledge in the bottom of the shaft. It is an iron ore carrying gold and copper.

The Poorman. Although the Mackintosh syndicate has acquired the Poorman, no change in the development of the property has occurred as yet. Stoping is in progress in the upper level, where the ledge is about five feet wide. Shipments last week amounted to 115 tons, and more is to be sent to the smelter this week.

The Victory-Triumph. David B. Bogle, the manager of the Victory-Triumph, is expected back from England this week, when work will be resumed in the Victory-Triumph. Op erations will be concentrated in the dritt, which has been driven about 190

The Great Western. Work on the Great Western has been resumed under the supervision of John Movnahan. The present shaft will be straightened and made the main working opening, and connection will also be made underground with the short shaft already constructed.
