Tries to Sell Locally

I always try to get some men here in St. John's to make offers for our fish. I have had offers of \$5 for fish from men in St. John's, that they had to pay \$6.30 for subsequently, be cause we would not take less. If consider the price offered is not sufficient. I advise the men to hold back their fish until the price goes up. If we tell them to hold back for \$6

they will stand by us. The year before last I went to some merchants on Water Street and asked for an offer.

"I will give you \$5.50 for Green Bay fish," one said "We won't sell it less than \$6.00,

was my reply. I then sent a message to the fishermen telling them to keep their fish.

"Why didn't you offer that price bofer?" /I asked.


