POPE BETTER SAY REPORTS

But His Physician Will Not Allow Him to Read Newspapers.

(Canadian Press Dispatch) ROME, April 11.—The Pope was feeling rather stronger to-day, and expressed his extreme disappointment at not being able to receive the pilgrims from Venice. He said he would have liked to have made an effort or to have been carried before them, and to impart to them the apostolic benediction, but Prof. Marchieva absolutely refused to consent either to that or to anything of the kind.

On learning of this decision of his physician, the Pope asked Cardinal Merry Del Val, the Papal secretary of state, to receive the pilgrims for him in the royal hall, where he would give them a reception of great solemnity, and to impart to them a blessing in his name. The secretary of state was told also to deliver a short address to them, and to hand to each of them a commemorative medal.

At four o'clock this afternoon, Cardinal Merry Del Val received over 3,000 pilgrims of different nationalities, the largest gathering ever received by any Cardinal at the Vatican. A sister and a niece of the Pope visited him to-day and remained several hours in his room, while Mgr. Bressan, private secretary to his holiness, celebrated mass. The Pope prayed, sitting up in bed.

Complaints of Pains The Pope at times complains of pains in the small of the back, which increase when he sits up, also when he coughs. These and other symptoms are attributed by the physicians to renal neuralgia, arising from influenza, and remedies have been applied to insure free reaction of the internal organs.

Although the amelioration in the condition of the Pontiff continues, Prof. Marchieva is apparently not quite satisfied with the progress of the recovery of strength. He is inflexible in his decision not to allow his patient to undergo any exertion. The Pope himself declares that he feels better, and has expressed his desire to read the newspapers, saying that after what was invented when he was ill the first time, he is curious to see what they have been capable of doing after his relapse. Prof. Marchieva, however, refused to permit him to read, whereupon the Pontiff exclaimed: "That shows they must have killed and buried me."

Many Cases With Police

Threatening to Shoot Charge Disposed of By Magistrate Livingston To day.

There were a number of cases on the docket this morning in Police Court. The first case that of William Lowe, whom Constable Kerr arrested in the vicinity of Princeton. Lowe threatened to shoot a neighbor, appeared in court this morning.

Mr. Hollinrake appeared in his interests. He stated that the defendant was evidently a nervous wreck and if allowed to go his brother had promised to sell out a night's lodging after the brother in future. Under these conditions Magistrate Livingston allowed him to go on suspended sentence.

Thos Dinham appeared on a vagrancy charge. Prisoner claimed he came up from Hamilton yesterday and tried to "bum" a night's lodging. He claimed it to be his debut in police court circles. His Worship said: "You'd better go and get some work."

Robt. Ray also made a bid for a bed in the police station. He was under the influence of liquor when he came in but was evidently none the worse for it. He was allowed to go provided he secure work at once.

Wm. Harrison who has been appearing frequently in police court circles, put in an appearance again this morning. Harrison billed himself on the night, but he has not entirely overcome the habit yet and last night he got a "snort" or two and the "bobbies" got him. "You may go, Harrison," said His Worship.

Hadrig Moshoian charged Moses Matosian with aggravated assault. The defendant was in court but the plaintiff is laid up in bed. Whether it is the result of the fist encounter or not the officers were unable to say. The case was adjourned till Monday.

Heavy Fine. Wm. Windle appeared in court charged with too fire and frequent an internal application of hot stuff. Windle brought his booze from Paris. He couldn't get it here as he is billed. He appeared in court yesterday on the same charge. Windle claims he got the bottle and hid it and got drunk again yesterday and he returned to court this morning. The Magistrate was of the opinion he was getting it in town somewhere. He was given \$20 and costs or two months.

William Howe was in court on a charge of supplying an Indian with liquor. He's father appeared in court and said he was at home on Monday morning and went out about noon. Howe's mother also said he was at home all morning. It was Monday morning the Indian claims he got him the whiskey. His Worship said he thought Howe secured the Indian the liquor, "but, however, if you are doing that kind of business, you had better cut it. You will get the benefit of the doubt."

TWO HUNDRED NEW ARRIVALS

Maltese Arrive in Brantford And are Being Placed at Work.

Nearly two hundred men from Malta have arrived in the city recently, and are being given situations by the different manufacturing establishments and contractors. They are a good class of immigrants, as they are industrious and can speak pretty good English, having been educated in the government schools in Malta. Mr. Louis Stander states that he has already placed several of the new arrivals in jobs. Malta is the famous British coaling station, and the new arrivals are thoroughly conversant with British methods.

The Coal Famine. SAULT STE. MARIE, April 11.—Arrangements have been concluded between the deputy Minister of Marine, E. W. Frazer, acting for the Canadian Government, and John Wolvin, owner of the steamer St. Ignace, whereby the St. Ignace is to open the channel in St. Mary's river from Detroit to Lake Superior. The two Soos are threatened with a coal famine, the Algoma Steel Company is short of fuel and dealers are practically sold out. Boats loaded with coal are waiting for the opening of the river. The ice in mid-lake is reported solid, but last night's rains did much to weaken it. The ice crusher left St. Ignace this morning at 7.30.
