STROPHIS OF CANADIAN HOME WEST LAND REGULATIONS

FREE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a vacant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—A homestead residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Free cultivation patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

Duties—51 months residence upon acquisition of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within six miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, or on a certain number of habitable houses is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—51 months residence in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres extra cultivation.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be submitted for cultivation under certain conditions.
