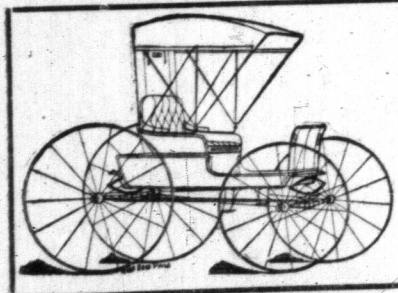

## A BALLOON RACE. THE DISTRICT

The Ocean Stopped an Exciting Event Near Vincennes, France,

During Which Daring Aeronauts Gossiped as They Flew Past on the Wings of the Wind.

Paris, Aug. 16.—A long distance balloon race, which started from Parc d'Aerostation at Vincennes could not be brought to a successful conclusion as the leading balloons were stopped by the ocean. The first prize may go to Comte de la Vaulx, whose balloon, the Horizon, of 3,300 cubic meters' capacity, the largest in the competition, descended at Guerande, in the department of the Loire Inferieur.

The Temps points out that nothing would be easier than to avoid races that must necessarily be such failures. As regards a distance record it would suffice for the committee to have the option of transforming the distance race into a landing contest at a given spot, when the wind blows toward the ocean. This would evoke no complaint since the same aeronauts always compete. On Aug. 19 will take place the contest for landing at a given point. M. Emmanuel Aime, who is the secretary of the Aero club, was interviewed on his aerial trip in the Orient of 1,048 cubic meters. He said: "We shot up to a height of 1,000 meters. The wind carried us toward the south. Then we drifted westward until we arrived at La Fleche and anchored, as we had no more ballast. During the trip our balloon passed several other balloons and we even conversed with M. Faure in his balloon."

## EUROPE'S TERMS.

China Will Probably Consent to Them Without Trouble.

Once the Legationers Are Safe—A Gigantic Reform Scheme.

New York, Aug. 15.—Pritchard Morgan, M. P., whose close relations with Chinese commerce have enabled him to keep in close touch with events in the far east, sends the following cable from London to the World:

"Negotiations are proceeding in China between the imperial government and the commanders of the European forces to arrange conditions for handing over the foreigners now in Peking to the allied army."

"The point where the transfer shall be made is still in dispute, the question being whether it shall take place inside or outside the wall of Peking."

"Immediately the safety of the foreigners in Peking is assured Li Hung Chang will offer terms of settlement of the whole difficulty, giving full reparation to the powers, and an exemplary punishment of all the officials, both military and civil, who have been responsible for the outrages."

"As it is unlikely the present government of China can achieve the reform form of government, which will probably be proposed under which China will be governed by 10 native viceroys appointed for life. They will act under a supreme head, an European nominated by the powers. On a vacancy arising among the 10 chosen rulers the viceroys will have the right to nominate a man to fill the place, subject to the veto of the supreme head."

"The responsibility for the government of the country, under European surveillance, will be thrown upon the shoulders of the patriotic Chinese viceroys, with their assistants and the administration will be carried out broadly on lines suggested by the reformed imperial customs under Sir Robert Hart."

"China can only be governed by the Chinese. This fact is now recognized by all the European powers."

"Disarmament will prove a new scheme simultaneously with the organization of an effective police system."

"The capital will be moved to Shanghai. These proposals, the subject of the subject of interchanges of notes between the European chancelleries and Washington, and they will be found to supply the principles of a new Chinese administration."

## WRECKED TRAINS.

Two Bad Colorado Small Boys Destroyed Property Worth \$40,000.

Victor, Col., Aug. 16.—Arthur Taylor and George Featherstone, each 9 years old, are under arrest here charged with causing the wreck of the Midland Terminal passenger train half a mile east of Independence, and trying to wreck the Florence and Cripple Creek train from Bull Hill in the yards at Independence.

In the first instance they turned a switch, sending the passenger engine crashing into some freight cars on the siding. Two passengers were injured. About \$40,000 worth of property was destroyed.

They were detected and captured while making the second attempt at train wrecking. Their excuse was that they wanted to see a real big railroad wreck.
