WHAT AMERICANS THINK

Commenting on the new Canadian customs tariff introduced in the Dominion House by Finance Minister Fielding, the Buffalo Commercial (Republican) editorially says: "So far as the Canadian tariff affects American interests it may be said to be 'as you like it'—to the extent of a ten per cent. discount. It is a little early yet to determine how far this option is likely to operate in creating sentiment in this country in favor of a reciprocity treaty with Canada. The subject is not likely to be revived in a separate form in the near future, but to be considered in the general tariff enquiry that it is sure to come, soon or late—probably soon."

The Evening Times (Democrat) says: "The new customs tariff measure now before the Dominion Parliament provides for a British preferential tariff tending to increase trade with the mother country, which is the natural thing for the Canadians to seek a general tariff which is applicable to all countries not entitled to the preferential tariff and an intermediate tariff not applied to any country at present, but a standing offer to other countries which may enter into negotiations for reciprocal concessions in trade. The intermediate rates are about ten per cent. less than the general tariff."

"Thus the way is left open for the United States to establish closer trade relations with Canada, an opportunity which should be taken advantage of."

It will be fortunate if H. S. Clements, M. P. for West Kent, can succeed in arousing parliament to the hardship of the occupants of flat lands on the Thames below Chatham. The periodical flooding out of these farms could undoubtedly be prevented at a small expenditure.—Windsor Record, (Liberal.)

The police magistrate of Hamilton appears to have solved the question of quelling riots by sentencing one of the rioters to two years in prison. Owing to the hopeless attitude of the authorities there during the early part of the trouble a section of the populace appeared to have gotten the idea that rioting was a joyous pastime and that stoning street cars and policemen and wrecking store fronts was a legitimate evening amusement. The sharp application of the law on the first offender found guilty will go far to cause all classes to realize that rioting is a very serious criminal offence, often involving much loss of life. Just about this time in Canada a few salutary examples are necessary, but it is too bad that some of them do not include those most deserving of punishment, namely, the inciters to riot.—Ottawa Citizen.

MORE SAN JOSE SCALE.

To the Editor of The Planet:

Sir,—I am afraid the public will tire of reading my letters in relation to the San Jose Scale and its extermination, but I am enthusiastic about fruit growing and I always did like to hear our good county mentioned as one of the best fruit growing sections in the Dominion, but we are getting away from it simply because we have done nothing but sit down and let a serious pest destroy all our trees.

Mr. Backus in Friday's issue of your paper has written a capital letter on the scale and its demotion, and I agree with him in nearly all that he says, but I must remind him that the Codling Moth, the Tussock Moth and other pests are not of the same nature as the San Jose Scale and can be got rid of without a contact spray, whereas the scale must have a contact spray. I am aware it is impossible to get rid of it by hand, but it can be kept in check, and from my experience the lime, sulphur and salt is the best, it makes the female scale sick, if it does not kill her, and she is not in condition to lay eggs in the same quantity as if she were healthy, as I have proved by their decrease.

I am also aware this particular spray is a nasty thing to handle, but that we can't help, and it is not any more expensive in the long run, because it is effective, and I know it. Of course killing it by its parasite is perhaps the best method, and I have seen its supposed parasite, and to buy a few of them if they could be got would run up in the hundreds of dollars, and we are not too certain that they can stand our climate, that is and multiply in a sufficient quantity to overcome the scale, and probably while we were waiting our trees, scale and all would be gone.

As regards tall trees, no experienced fruit grower of the present day allows his trees to be tall, and if the Government orders all such trees infected with scale to be cut down good-bye to our shade trees, and we shall have to be setting about looking for another name for Chatham other than the "Maple City."

I forgot to mention that in using parasites or the natural enemies of pests, the remedy is sometimes worse than the disease. Take the importation of rabbits into Australia, and when the vermin imported to destroy them arrived there, their said vermin took on another nature and began killing the lambs. The English sparrows is another instance; he has changed his habits considerably to suit this country, and although he does eat destructive insects he doesn't eat enough of them, and he attacks our grain, etc., and the insects still go on doing their work.

I shall now leave Mr. Backus to tell the public how to rid our orchards of scale. From his point of view, and I feel certain his advice will be good. These discussions do lots of good. I set the ball rolling.
