DUSTY STREET

Board of Works Should Bring the Sprinkler into Commission, so Says Annoyed Merchant

The dusty state of Chatham's main thoroughfare on dry days is occasioning both comment and complaint from King St. store-keepers. When the dust is being blown about by shifting winds and disturbed by passing vehicles and pedestrians, it is an utter impossibility to keep it from entering the stores and settling on the goods inside. To some tradesmen this may mean a loss of extra work and annoyance and the constant use of the duster, but to others the trouble has a more serious side. We refer to grocers and others who keep articles of food for human consumption and who, in spite of their own unceasing efforts to maintain a high standard of quality and purity in their wares, are defeated by the lack of proper insulation from the dust of the road.

A King St. merchant, speaking to a Planet reporter this morning, asked why the Board of Works do not use the city sprinkler during this dry and dusty weather, and also wanted to know if it were not adding insult to injury to sweep the street without first sprinkling it? Several others made reference to the same thing, the consensus of opinion being that King St. has lately been more like a miniature Sahara than, as it has frequently been called, the Woodward Avenue of the Maple City.
