TORONTO LIVE STOCK.

Receipts of live stock at the city market
to-day, as reported by the railways, since
Tuesday, were 96 head of cattle, composed of
1470 cattle, 1192 hogs, 238 sheep and about
100 calves.

Exporters.

A few lots of exporters sold at \$4.75 to
\$5.25 per cwt., the bulk going at \$5 per
cwt. Export bulls sold from \$3.75 to \$4.25
per cwt.

Butchers.

Choice picked lots sold at \$4.75 to \$5 per
cwt. of lots sold at \$4.50 to \$4.60; me-
dium at \$4.75 to \$4.85; common, \$3.25 to
\$3.50; cows, \$3 to \$4; canners, \$1.75 to \$2.25
per cwt. There were several loads of but-
cher cattle unsold, drovers having bought
them at too high prices in the country to
take less money than they paid the farm-
ers.

Feeders and Stockers.

H. Murby reports feeder and stocker
trade about steady, with the good, heavy
feeders a little scarce. What few there
were on the market sold higher. There
were a large number of light stockers mar-
keted this week, which about held their
own in price, although the demand was limited
and there will be few of this class held
over. Mr. Murby bought 400 head this
week at the following quotations: best
short-keepers, 1150 to 1250 lbs., at \$4.50 to
\$4.75; medium short-keepers, 1150 to 1250
lbs., at \$4.40 to \$4.60; best feeders, 950 to
1100 lbs., at \$3.85 to \$4.25; best feed-
ers, 800 to 950 lbs., at \$3.60 to \$4; medium
feeders, 800 to 950 lbs., at \$3.35 to \$3.60;
best stockers, 900 to 750 lbs., at \$3.30 to
\$3.50; best stock feeders, 500 to 750 lbs., at
\$3.10 to \$3.35; common stockers, \$2.75 to \$3.

Milk Cows.

About 40 milk cows and springers, many
of which were of common to medium qual-
ity, sold at lower prices. Prices ranged
from \$25 to \$30 each, which caused many
drovers dealing in cows to drop money.

Veal Calves.

About 100 veal calves were offered. The
bulk of the calves were of inferior quality
and prices for them were easier. Prices
ranged from \$3.50 to \$7 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs.

Receipts were light, with prices about
steady. Export ewes sold at \$4.75 to \$5.25;
bucks, \$4 to \$4.50; choice lambs at \$6.75
to \$7.25 per cwt.; mixed lots of lambs at
\$5.50 to \$6.50 per cwt. Western Duns
bought the bulk at these prices.

Hogs.

About 1200 hogs were bought by Mr.
Harris, who reports prices unchanged at
\$0.85 for select and \$0.80 for lights and
fats.
