Legal Decisions

1. Any person who takes a paper regularly from the Post Office—whether directed to his name or otherwise or whether he has subscribed or not—is responsible for the payment.

2. If a person orders his paper discontinued, the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount, whether the paper is taken from the office or not.

3. The courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers and periodicals from the Post Office, or removing and leaving them uncollected for prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
