Letters to the Editor.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE ACADIAN.
MR. EDITOR.—I have read with much interest the Annual Report of the Town of Wolfville, recently received. The reports of the Mayor and Committees indicate that much time has been given to looking after the affairs of the town for which, it seems to me, the citizens should be very thankful.

I am pleased to note the strong temperance sentiment of the Council as expressed in the report of the Police and License Committee. I see also that the need for a Curfew Bell is admitted by the Committee. They say "it is a fact that if the children of tender years could be kept at home at night we would not have a continual supply of torches growing up to fill the ranks of those who annually retire. Recruits are coming forward in a great many cases where we might expect the parents to have a little Curfew of their own." Having thus recognized the evil and the remedy for it I do not see how the Council can excuse themselves for not applying the remedy. The welfare of "these children" of tender years" and the good name of the town demand that "the experiment" be tried.

There is another thing which helps to increase the class complained of, to which I find no reference in the report of the Council. I refer to the non-attendance at school of some of the children of the town. These children are not only growing up in ignorance but in most cases without being taught to obey any one. What wonder if later on they are found in the ranks of the lawless and disorderly? I notice in the Annual Report of the Town of Truro this evil is referred to and the suggestion is made to the incoming Board to adopt some means for securing the attendance of these children, "either by employing the services of a transient officer or making some arrangement with the regular police staff to do this work." Could not our Council adopt one or the other of these methods?
