## Will Erect Plant at Corner Brook, Bay of Islands

We learn that the Sir W. G. Armstrong, Whitworth & Co., Ltd., and Newfoundland Power and Paper Company, Ltd., have decided to construct a transmission line from Deer Lake to tide-water at Bay of Islands, with the object of selling electric power, surplus to that required in the Pulp and Paper Mill designed for the Nfld. Power and Paper Co., Ltd. It has also been decided, in view of this, to erect the Paper Mill at tide-water, thus effecting a saving in operating costs to the Company. A conservative estimate of the cost of this transmission line will be \$250,000.00, the financial arrangements being made by the Sir W. G. Armstrong, Whitworth & Co., Ltd.

In addition to this the Company will establish storage and shipping facilities on an immense scale at Port aux Basques or Channel as well as deepen the harbor. These works will mean an expenditure in this section of over a million dollars.

It is no wonder that the people are supporting the Squires Govt. in this election. A verdict against the Humber Project, and there is not a district in the whole Island which is going to risk that. Newfoundland is fully secured in this wonderful undertaking, and every dollar's worth of property is mortgaged to the Nfld. and the British Govts. as security for any guarantee.

The control of the Power and Paper Co. will not be held by the Reids, nor will any part of the capital guaranteed by the Government of the Colony be paid to the Reids in respect to any Reid properties that may be included in the areas which the Nfld. Power and Paper Company will operate.

The wonderful news coming in now shows that Squires has got the country behind him in this great industrial policy. The election result is already conceded, that Squires is coming back.

## Political Cowardice Indicates Tory Defeat

### Crosbie Afraid to Face Bonavista Bay—His Bluff Called

The Opposition cause has met bad weather from the start and the barometer still falls. For some time past both Cashin and Crosbie privately admitted that the Government had eleven seats north of Bonavista; now they practically concede it in the press.

They announce Tory northern candidates with funeral lamentations and ask the general public to hope that these candidates will put up a worthy fight for their unworthy cause against the work and welfare of the people.

But apart from these signs of the times, it was very significant on the part of the Cashin-Tory organs to rush out, on Thursday last, with the announcement that Crosbie was going with Paddester to Bay de Verde. Of course, this was not a shock to those who took notice of this event. Most people got Crosbie's measure by this time and ever since that frost of a sealer's meeting, when northern men showed Crosbie and Bennett where the north stood, it was known that Crosbie did not have courage to go to Bonavista District and contest it against President Coaker and the northern men whom he and his political clique never miss an opportunity to abuse in the press or on public platforms.

Here was a piece of cowardice.

Filled up with a vain conceit of his own importance, and as equally fooled by Jesse Winsor, Sir John combined forces with A. B. Morine and was going to wile Bonavista Bay off the map. He proceeds to do so by running away from Port de Grave and going to Bay de Verde.

Where Sir John is known best he is wanted least and he seems to know it. The gold of Rocketteller would not elect him in Port de Grave District and he is basing his election hopes in the chance that Bay de Verde electors will forget some of the reasons why he deserted that district for Port de Grave in 1919. It is a truth that this man could not be sure of his election in any district in the country; and this is he, who, with Cashin, pretends they are the friends of the common people.

Mr. Coaker, as his political campaign in Bonavista District shows, is the idol of the people. He has represented them faithfully and well and he does not have to run away from his constituents but is greeted by them with open arms, while his small-minded abusers bark like crackles behind an iron fence.

## The Tide of Victory Rises

### Great Outbursts of Enthusiasm North for the Government's Policy of Development

The great mass meeting addressed by Messrs. Coaker, Abbott and Winsor in Bonavista town on Monday night threw a bombshell in the Tory Merchant Party camp, which sent Crosbie scurrying off to Bay de Verde and created general demoralization in Opposition ranks.

One thousand electors were present at the Bonavista meeting and, with a great outburst of enthusiasm, demonstrated a solid support for the Government.

That was Bonavista's answer to the Cashin-Crosbie abuse of Coaker. Today, the settlements of Newman's Cove, Amherst Cove and Birchy Cove give the Cashin-Crosbie-Bennett combination an answer equally as effective as Bonavista's. These settlements are absolutely solid for Messrs. Coaker, Abbott and Winsor and will not tolerate the noxiousness of the Tory Merchant Party.

No wonder they are conceding the eleven northern seats to the Government. Though it is clearly needless for them to try to make the rest of the country believe what they say of Mr. Coaker and the Fishermen's Union.

The northern men are not the ignorant collage that Cashin called them and they have an experience of what the F.P.V. is. Mr. Coaker means to their interests. When they are so solid in support of the Government, it may reasonably be seen that the Cashin-Crosbie propaganda is a rife fabrication of lying and abuse, which is self-admitted by the sending of such political dummies as Jim Ayre, Short, Peters, Moore, King, Stone and others to the north.

## Outerbridge and the Whip of Public Opinion

The whip of public opinion is scourging the Tory Party severely these days.

On Monday last the Tory Opposition Candidates, Higgins, Fox and Vinicombe, held a meeting at the C.C.C. Hall. Many other candidates spoke among them being Mr. P. E. Outerbridge. The next day the Advocate had an item drawing attention to Outerbridge's speech in which he used the word "loosey" in reference to teachers in speaking of the Normal School. The Advocate has also drawn attention to the vulgar expression on other occasions, and pointed out that it reflected most upon Higgins and all these who laughed and applauded. Now to-day Mr. P. E. That is the point which the Advocate has been making and which has put Higgins in "bad" with the electors of St. John's East, because these electors feel insulted at having to listen to such talk.

Hearers of Outerbridge have come to the Advocate this morning, saying that he did refer to the teachers in the way which he did. They also draw attention to the fact that it is nearly a week now since the report of the meeting. Where has Outerbridge been since that? The suggestion is made that the Tory Leaders have put it up to Outerbridge to deny the report or set out of the Party, and the rumours spread the past few days were to the effect that he had been run out of the Party. At any rate Outerbridge is not doing his cause any good by a denial of his vulgar words at last Monday's meeting.
