London, August 30.—The American schooner Laura C. Anderson, was sunk by bombs from a German submarine on Thursday. All the members of the crew were picked up and landed at an English port.

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**TWO WERE KILLED BY PREMATURE BLAST**  
Victoria, Aug. 29.—Through the premature explosion of over 100 pounds of dynamite, which they had loaded into one of seven holes, later to be shot off in conjunction with the rock-blasting work now in progress on the former Songhees Indian Reserve, Ross Kelly and David Gowdy were instantly killed yesterday afternoon, their mangled bodies being thrown seventy-five feet into the air and hurled to a considerable distance.

The cause of the explosion is a mystery. Both men were expert powder men, having been engaged in similar work for years and both were known among their fellows as careful workmen. Kelly especially having had forty years' experience in that class of work.

For an hour after the accident other men employed on the work, under the direction of Superintendent W. Russell Humber, were engaged in recovering the mangled remains of the two bodies, which were taken to the undertaking room of the B. C. Funeral Furnishing Company. Dr. Stanier, coroner, who was summoned to the scene of the accident, will hold an inquest on Friday.

The accident the worst that has occurred since the reserve work was initiated two and one-half years ago, brings the deaths of men engaged on the work to three, a workman having been killed a year ago by flying rock. But it is the first time that any serious accident has occurred through the handling of explosives, although very large quantities have been used in almost continuous blasting operations that have been in progress.

Buenos Ayres Aug. 30.—It is announced that the Argentine Government will not ask a renewal of the \$11,000,000 loan which expires in 1918.

**MATTY BUYS WRONG MAN FOR CINCINNATI**  
Christy Mathewson appears to have become the victim of one of the oddest bluffs in baseball, but one which has happened a number of times. The bluff consists in buying one human chattel when another is intended. Charley Ebbetts once had a chance to draft Mike Doohan, one of the greatest shortstops, but made a clerical error and drafted a man named Dolan, who wasn't worth a hoot.

Matty's freak purchase was revealed when Herb Pillel, a pitcher, and G. Raymond Lafayette, a what-is-it-blow in from Tacoma Tigers, of the exploded Northwestern league, to join the Cincinnati Reds. Pillel proved to be as advertised, a huge right-handed pitcher, but Lafayette seems to be a six-foot joke on Matty or Garry Hermann, or the famous Cincinnati board of directors.

Lafayette was bought in the slave mart as a catcher and was welcomed as such. He knocked Matty flat by saying he never caught a professional game in his life, but was an infielder and mostly a first baseman. A first baseman on a team that has Hal Chase going at his very best would have a fat chance—not!

There was a Raymond playing second and short for Tacoma, and he seems to be the man Matty got. Matty was busy trying to find out how that catcher thought originated in his head and in those of other Cincinnati officials.

**POLICE CHARGED MOB OF ANTS**

Those nearby, thinking him a conspirator, made a rush for him.

E. Mongeau, in the course of a deliverance, admitted that he was taking risks in opposing the enforcement of the act, but consoled himself with the impression that if he were arrested the jail doors would be broken.

It was Mongeau who aroused enthusiasm when he suggested that Labor Day would hold a new significance if it ushered in a general strike. He admitted that men must eat and that if they went on strike food would be required. But he would show those on strike where they could get what food they required in five minutes. He knew a place where they could get "supplies enough for a week." And if they were hungry the week following, there were depots in Montreal containing a year's supply. His first principle was a general strike. The possibility of going to jail caused him no fear.

Mongeau stated that in two weeks proclamations would appear notifying all those of military age to register at the recruiting offices. His advice was to remain at home and not to register. Then emissaries would be sent to each house. Before that time came, he suggested, old revolvers should be cleaned up, so that when an emissary "called for your name you can make hindrance."

Among the remarks made by Robert Parson, now recognized as an English anarchist, was that the government and conspirators thought when a scrap of paper was signed there would be no more meetings. But the jails had doors and, if need be, the doors could be smashed to pieces. At another time he said that if the government wanted to have the conscription law to be applied to start a revolution in Canada it was "going to get it." He also stated that he was not for violence, but when any human being threatened him that if he did not become a murderer, then he would get ready to meet him as he would any murderer.

Paul Lafortune reiterated a previously expressed remark that the dynamiting of Lord Atholstan's house had been well done, and he was not afraid to say so. Lafortune, classifying those Canadians who favor conscription, included "war profiteers, the unfit and old maids." He said the people should arm to fight the Boches "in Germany and elsewhere."

Le Devoir notes the signing of the Military Service Bill by the Governor-General with the publication of this editorial satire:

"The Governor-General has signed at Toronto the conscription bill. A member remarked in the Commons last night that the location is excellent. It is Toronto that has inspired this law; it is at Toronto that the Governor-General takes the responsibility for it. It should pass into history under the title of 'the law of Toronto.'"
