A PARTIZAN SENATE.

The partizan Liberal press is throwing around threats that their majority in the Senate, which threw out several important Government measures last session, will persist in similar tactics when the House meets again. This plot to foil the popular will by the action of the non-elective chamber is one which will not commend itself to the thinking public, or indeed to the majority of those composing the Liberal party. Only the most rabid partisans are disposed to use their allies in the Senate to the injury of the country in general. Take the Government grant to the good road movement for instance, which was one of the measures killed in the Senate last session. New Brunswick's share of that grant would have been upwards of \$50,000 for the present year, and which in all likelihood would have been increased in following years. But even that amount, in addition to the regular Provincial grants, would have made an appreciable difference on the roads of the Province. From a spirit of pique in the Liberal ranks, New Brunswick lost that \$50,000 for its roads during the present year, and now we hear the Liberal press urging the non-representative majority in the Senate to continue their obstructive tactics when they again meet and refuse this great boon to the good road movement for another year.

In view of the plan to defeat the popular will, the task faces the Borden Ministry of devising some method of outflanking the enemies of responsible government. When existing vacancies in the Senate are filled the party standing will still be: Liberals 59, Conservatives 28. Under the last census the West will be given nine additional Senators—two for each of the Prairie Provinces and three for British Columbia. This change will still leave the Liberals a clear majority of 15 in an Upper House of 86 members. In the ordinary course of events several sessions may elapse before this lead disappears and the Government chosen by the electors secures a majority in both Houses.

There should be some way, however, of overcoming those who would continue to veto the will of the electors. A clause of the British North America Act empowers the Governor General in Council, with the King's consent, to appoint additional Senators to break a deadlock between the Houses. By way of preparation against a possible emergency, Premier Borden might do well to lay the case before the British Ministers during his present visit to the Old Country, but it is most sincerely to be hoped that the bitter partisans who held up the country's business last spring may not render extreme measures necessary.

THE MEDICAL PROFESSION.

It is announced that at the coming annual convention of the Canadian Medical Association at Edmonton, final steps will be taken to establish a registration system whereby any doctor authorized to practice medicine in one province of Canada will be entitled to practice in all.

This is a consummation which should be a matter of gratification to every Canadian.
Hitherto, a New Brunswick doctor could not practise in Ontario or Quebec, or any other province, or vice versa. A young doctor in the east desiring to go west could not take up his profession in the new field. It is on record that a medical man, near Ottawa, crossing the Ottawa river to save life was fined for doing so—and not by Quebec authorities either. Each province jealously guarded its own selfishness or prejudice. A Canadian medical man was no Canadian.

Broad-minded medical men in all the provinces recognized the discredit of the condition, from both a patriotic and an intellectual point of view, and a movement arose to end it which found an exceptionally weighty and resolute champion in Dr. Roddick of Montreal.

Dr. Roddick, as a member of Parliament for many years, was able to give special assistance to the movement, and it is largely owing to him that legislation by the Dominion Parliament and by the Provincial legislatures has enabled a new start.

Under the present system, all certificates already issued to existing practitioners by the various provincial medical boards will be accepted by a Dominion medical board, which will then take over the examination of all medical men seeking to practice, and certificates issued by this board will enable the holders to practice in any part of the Dominion of Canada.

So another gain is scored for the principle that a Canadian in one part of Canada is a Canadian in every part.

THE LUMBER TARIFF.

The appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada, which has been instituted in the case of tariff interpretation respecting "sized" lumber, will doubtless settle finally a point upon which there has been much discussion, agitation and incidentally much misrepresentation of the government's attitude. For many years this particular kind of material, of which there are heavy importations to Canada, has been coming in duty free, according to the interpretation of the Customs department. Western lumbermen, however, more particularly those from British Columbia, contested this interpretation and held that the law was being evaded and heavy importations made of what was really subject to a 25 per cent duty. In view of the rival contentions, the government took the proper course in consenting to a test case in the exchequer court. That tribunal has upheld the imposition of the duty. To secure final adjudication the case is to be carried to the supreme court and to the large volume of imports and the extent to which the revenues may be affected.

The government's position has been deliberately misrepresented in the West, where an attempt has been made to place upon it the responsibility for imposing the duty. Nothing is further from the facts. It is the duty of the Customs department to interpret the tariff and to collect the customs revenue. In pursuance of that, the department has always maintained that "sized" lumber was not dutiable and it still takes that position. The learned judge of the exchequer court, however, has ruled otherwise. Where there is still a doubt the proper course is now being taken to appeal from this ruling, in order that the question may be conclusively determined. But whatever the outcome, it is obviously unfair to attempt to blame the ministry for the imposition of the duty when all it has done consists in consenting to a reference of the matter to the courts with a view of clearing up a much disputed point.
