## CHATHAM THIEF TO STAND TRIAL

Paul Gallant Sent Up for  
Trial---Pleaded Guilty  
of Other Officers.

### JUNK STOLEN

(Special News Service)  
CHATHAM, Wednesday.—The trial of Paul Gallant, was continued today, and the prisoner was remanded until Saturday on a charge of breaking into Moss' store.

Captain Cain was again on the stand and he denied that he had urged Gallant to commit the crime. Both had been drinking and were not in a condition to act soberly.

The magistrate heard all the evidence and decided that the prisoner must stand trial. J. A. Haviland represented Gallant, and Robert Murray Capt. Cain.

It is reported here that members of this crew were responsible for a raid made some weeks ago on W. L. T. Weldon's jollifying shop, when money, coats, pants, and suit lengths were taken.

A second case was also taken up against Gallant, that of stealing some clothes belonging to Mrs. Dugan. On this charge the prisoner pleaded guilty and will be sentenced on Saturday.

Capt. Cain and Gallant, who will be sent up for trial, were bound over to appear before the supreme court at Newcastle in October.

The police have received word from Nicholas Cunningham that about \$100 worth of brass, lead and iron, stored in the Miramichi Fur Tanning Co.'s building, near the station, has been stolen.

The goods belonged to Edward Lantam of St. John and nothing was known of the robbery until Mr. Lantam made an investigation at Mr. Lantam's suggestion. The goods are supposed to have been stolen when the Snowball Company and the Miramichi Lumber Company had a quantity of brass stolen from them.

## ACCUSED MURDER JUMPS INTO SEA

While Being Taken to Nome  
He Eluded Guards and  
Jumped Overboard.

### MAY HAVE ESCAPED

MAXVILLE, Ont., Wednesday.—The news of the escape of Leo M. Johnston, while being brought to Nome, to stand his trial on the charge of murdering his wife, Bella Gilchrist Johnson, formerly of Maxville, Ont., has created excitement in this locality. Johnston, who was in the local jail, was being taken to the ship, when he jumped overboard and succeeded in making the shore.

The man may now be at large in the country and the police are on the search for him.

Before the escape, Johnston heard the authorities had found the remains of the supposed victim and that they had been identified by two doctors as those of a female. On receiving the news he expressed fear of being lynched as soon as the vessel reached Nome.

## C. P. R. STRIKE IS DECLARED OFF NOW

WENNEBAGO, Man., Wednesday.—The strike of the C. P. R. machinists which started in August was declared off early today. The terms of settlement have not yet been announced.

It was decided to declare the strike off in the west first. This will be followed by a similar declaration in the east.

MONTREAL, Que., Wednesday.—The story from the west that the western section of the C. P. R. strikers would go back to work first, leaving the eastern sections to follow suit, later on, is denied here today by Mr. James Sommerville, a prominent official in the strike.

## CANADA'S TRADE GROWING RAPIDLY

Large Increase in the Exports From  
the Dominion to New  
Zealand.

### LARGE INCREASE IN PAPER

OTTAWA, Tuesday.—J. S. Larke, Canadian Trade Commissioner of New Zealand, reports to Trade and Commerce Department that Canada's trade with the sister Dominion is growing at rapid rate. For last fiscal year of New Zealand the imports from Canada totalled \$205,536, as compared with \$52,374 in 1902. The exports to Canada totalled \$78,015 as compared with \$7,366 in 1902.

The paper trade shows the largest development Canada selling to New Zealand last year paper valued at \$60,655, or three times the amount exported in 1905.

Canada's present prosperity was not an accident, but the outcome of the wise policy of the Liberal Government.

He had been drinking heavily and took umbrage at a remark made by a neighbor named Duchesne. The latter tried to pacify the crazed man, but was unable to run for his life, as Aspirot had snatched up an axe and made for him.

### ROUSING MEETINGS

FREDERICTON, N. B., Wednesday.—N. W. Brown held a rousing meeting last night at Canterbury station and was given very hearty reception. Councillor Carr presided and a feature of the meeting was the speech of Councillor Grant, a Conservative, who came out flat-footed for Mr. Brown.

The popularity of Councillor Grant in the parish of Canterbury may be judged from the fact that in the last municipal election his name appeared on every ballot cast in that contest.

Councillor Grant, speaking of Mr. Brown's dismissal from the office of school inspector, declared that previous to the last election the present representatives of York in the legislature, pledged their word that Mr. Brown would not be dismissed if there was a change of government. "I like men to keep their word when they do business with me," said Mr. Grant, "and although a Conservative, I shall not be a party to removing from office such a faithful official as Mr. Brown."

### AT BONAVENTURE

Mr. Charles Marcil, M. P., who addressed a large meeting in English on Monday evening in Quebec in favor of Mr. Power, Liberal candidate for Quebec west, and made the speech of his life, says Le Soleil, will be in Bonaventure county this week to organize his own election. In a letter written to one of Mr. Reid's committee men the popular member for Bonaventure suggested that he will be pleased to address a meeting in Campbellton during the campaign.

## COL LESLIE GOES FREE.

TORONTO, Ont., Tuesday.—This afternoon the sessions of the grand jury brought in no bill against Col. J. Knox Leslie, charged with stealing \$15,948.63 from the Toronto exhibition.

Mr. Mann, chairman of the investigating committee, asked Mr. Jones if, in his opinion, the pulpwood supply is amply sufficient for a most indefinite period. Mr. Jones replied by saying that in Maine the supply is perhaps practically inexhaustible, but in the middle west, especially in Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota, where most of the paper mills are situated, the manufacturers will soon be obliged to procure their pulpwood from Canada. "The only thing I see to do," said Mr. Jones, "is to make a treaty with Canada. Not as a tariff, not as a Republican party today and a Democratic party tomorrow, but a treaty whereby the tariff on wood pulp would be cut off and our mills were allowed to purchase pulpwood in Canada at the same figure that Canadian mills do, but I would also increase the duty on European pulp 100 percent. Europe is our greatest competitor, not Canada. The market of the United States and Canada is large enough to use all the wood pulp, sulphite and paper manufactured in this country, and Canada, if a treaty were made, and the duty on European goods increased.

## RICH GIRL ELOPES MAN GETS JEWELS

Daughter of a San Francisco Man  
Eloped With Man---Now  
Left Penniless.

### MONEY SENT FROM HOME

CHICAGO, Tuesday.—Mrs. William Titus, who said she was the daughter of a San Francisco millionaire, whose name she refused to give, fainted in the office of the Chicago police department today after she had told a story of having been robbed of \$4,000 worth of diamonds. According to her story she ran away from home and married in Buffalo, N. Y. After her arrival in Chicago several days ago she said her husband disappeared with her entire belongings. Telegrams sent by the police to an address in San Francisco were responded to with money orders and a query as to where money should be sent. The police refused to reveal the San Francisco address to the woman, who was placed in the care of a physician.

## BRUIN INVADES POTATOE PATCH

NEW CARLISLE, Que., Wednesday.—Arthur Cooke, a farmer, of this place was aroused late last night by a rustling sound in his potato patch, and upon going out to investigate, he was astonished on beholding a female bear, with her cubs trampling his vines.

Returning to the house, he secured a gun, and taking careful aim, he fired at the beasts, howling over the cub and wounding Mrs. Bruin.

He followed up his success with the second barrel which missed the mother bear, who was now frantic with rage. The cub must have been only wounded for it arose and joined the mother, and together they disappeared in a patch of woods.

The waters subsided yesterday and the country is strewn with unburied bodies, estimated to number not less than 1,000.

Many corpses are those of women and children. They are decomposing already, and as it is impossible to get them under ground promptly an outbreak of illness is feared. Many elephants are at present employed in removing the dead.

## MANUAL TRAINING FOR DALHOUSIE

T. B. Kidner Interviewed  
Citizens In Reference
