NEW SYSTEM OF PHYSICAL TRAINING

The pupil of the public schools of Northumberland and Restigouche Counties and part of York County, will soon have the advantage of a new system of physical training, which will be introduced by Inspector McCreesh, who is also the officer commanding the 73rd Regiment. The system will be much easier on the pupils than the one now in vogue and will be equally adapted for use by both the small and the larger pupil. Lieut. Col. McCreesh is at present taking a course at the local military school to prepare him for the work of instruction.

The increased price of factory butter led to a larger production in 1910 than in 1900, and this was made especially in Quebec at the cost of a lower production of cheese. The change was further induced by the lower rate of duty on cream in the United States, which encouraged larger exports to that country.

The number of condensed milk factories in operation increased from four in 1900 to twelve in 1910, and the value of product increased from \$269,529 to \$1,839,871. There are now six factories in Ontario with a product value of \$1,335,689, two in Nova Scotia with \$133,956, two in Quebec with \$275,000, one in British Columbia with \$44,326 and one in Prince Edward Island with \$50,900. In 1900 there were two factories in Nova Scotia and one each in Prince Edward Island and Ontario.

THE CHINAMAN

That a Late Chaplain to the Forces at Hong-Kong Thinks of the Chinese.

Napoleon said that when China was loved the face of Europe would be changed. For as the Chinese are naturally peaceful, we think that the yellow peril is a commercial one, he said. He said that China will manufacture things cheaper than Europeans can and displace us from the trade of the Far East. How can we, with our high standard of comfort, trade, and wages generally, compete with the Chinese, combining as they do, the active industry of the most civilized people with the passive obedience of the North American Indian? For more than we do the Chinese believe in the power of character and intellect. With this rather than with armies and navies, they will conquer.

A Chinese is nearly always a person of resources. A young man was accused of knocking out his father's teeth, and was in danger of being put to death. A friend visited him and whispered in his ear, "It's a bad case." Suddenly seeing the one between his teeth, he gave it a severe bite.

"What do you mean?" asked the young man, raising his fist.
"I mean," was the answer, "that you are saved; you have only to show the marks of my teeth and say that they were made by your father, whose teeth, being shaky, dropped out."

Business Before Settlement.

Two small things impress foreigners with the skill of the Chinese. One is the way they curve ivory balls, one within the other, and the other is the use of a small number of words to express a great number of ideas or objects.

A Chinaman always appears to be looking round the corners of his eyes at you, and to have a meaning that cannot get out. He gives you an impression that somebody, when he was born, set on his nose, and that he has been lamenting the calamity ever since. And yet, though he never looks round the corners of his eyes, he is not at all more miserable than the average Englishman.

Speaking of Britishers, we may say that they and Chinamen have much in common. Both have a great capacity for making and enjoying money. Both have business aptitude and integrity, do their work well, and appreciate a good dinner. Equally with Englishmen, Chinamen have common sense and respect for law, and do not allow sentiment to interfere with business. The Chinese are the British of the Far East, and the Japanese are the French.

Fond of Sport.

The Chinese are not less conservative than the English. They dread any change that may cause trouble or disorder, and this is why they have put up so long with their wretched government. "Better be a man in a cage," they say, "than a man in a prison." The "dog in a cage" has now been to war; let us hope that the splendid empire of China will not remain in anarchy.

Like the British, also, the Chinese are fond of sport, though their idea of sport is peculiar. They train oxen, thrushes, and even fish to fight, and they bet on these, and on almost every other event.

The Chinese contrivances for the management and capture of beasts, birds, and fish are ingenious as they are simple. If, for instance, a hen disturbs by braying in the night, a big stone is tied to its tail, and its head is held into silence. When a Chinaman wishes to catch a bird, he mixes an intoxicating drink of rice with corn and leaves the mixture for the birds. They become intoxicated, and are taken in their cups, so to speak. Another way is to put a gourd on his head and swim gently among the ducks. They are not frightened, because they only see the round red object accustomed to see and the bird John pulls one after another by the legs into a basket attached to him. Everyone knows that John Chinaman trains cormorants to catch fish, not for themselves but for him.

After cold water, there is nothing the Chinese so much fear as ridicule and disgrace, or the "loss of face." A man whose wife was to be beheaded, asked that, as a special favour, he might wear the robes of office in order to save his face.

The Chinese are great at organization. The trade guilds which are established in every town are quite as powerful as our trade unions. Even the poor and the lowly have guilds. Every morning the king of the beggars sends a detachment of his subjects to collect contributions in the districts assigned to them. Owners of property pay so much a year to "the charitable guild of thieves" in order not to be robbed.
