The Government had placed receipts in respect of work done by tractors and the sale of tractors and seed wheat in an account marked "casual revenue" when it should have appeared in the statement of receipts for the Department of Agriculture. (2) The treatment of receipts from disposal of capital assets as current receipts. The Government had received over \$679,000 in respect of timber bonuses and \$790,-000 in respect of timber dues which they had treated as current receipts. He explained that this money came into the hands of the Treasurer through the disposal of capital assets, and that the capital assets of the province were reduced in value accordingly.
