COMMERCIAL MARKETS.

U. S. STEEL ON BOURSE.

New York, June 3.—Official announcement that negotiations are under way to list the common stock of the United States steel corporation for trading on the Paris Bourse, made today by J. P. Morgan, jr., who was recently elected a director of the steel corporation, has caused a great deal of speculation. It is practically certain that the stock will be listed on the Paris Bourse, said Mr. Morgan. "It is not possible to give details at present, but they have not been settled. The Bourse, however, welcomes the admission of the steel common and will not doubt make reasonable concessions in its requirements."

VERMILION VALLEY CROPS DOING WELL

Winter Wheat Doing Well—Much Larger Acreage Under Crop Than Last Year—Growth is Splendid.

Vegreville, June 2.—Crops report throughout the Vermilion valley show the situation to be in advance of what it was at this date last year, and, in fact, in no year since grain has been grown in the valley has the outlook been brighter. Winter wheat, although not grown to any great extent, has stood the winter well and very few fields have been re-seeded. The cold and wet weather was not so prevalent during the past month as some districts. Consequently a comparatively early start was made at seeding. No surplus rain has fallen, the district, as a whole, rather light soil has absorbed all the moisture. Spring wheat and oats have had a phenomenal growth during the past two weeks and all the acreage seeded is now showing above ground. A greater amount of barley will be sown this spring than usual, and the bulk of it still remains to be put in the ground.

QU'APPELLE DIOCESE.

Bishop in Opening Address Deals with Progress and Prospects of Work.
Regina, Sask., June 2.—The only work of the synod of Qu'Appelle done this morning was the delivering of the address of the Bishop. This was from the pulpit of St. Paul's church, the service being conducted by the Bishop himself. There are over two hundred clergy and laymen in attendance and a large number attended the morning service. The Bishop in his address dealt with the work that has been done in the diocese and with what is ahead. He felt that in justice to the diocese he was in need of an assistant who could do the most tedious and strenuous work. That was to be one of the most important subjects to come before the synod.

EXHIBITION THE BEST EVER.

Signs are not wanting that the exhibition and stock show which is to be held at Edmonton on the 29th and 30th June and the 1st and 2nd July, will be "the best ever."

The details of a grand parade to be held on the opening day are now being arranged.
An Indian parade will also be held in which some 350 Indians, all decorated in their traditional costumes, will participate—200 of the braves will be mounted on horseback.
The platform attractions in front of the grand stand will be altogether unique and far in advance of anything ever seen before in Edmonton. The cowboy quartette will put on the same act as they had the honor of presenting before His Majesty the King in London, Eng., last year; the famous Gladstone children will give their wonderful singing, dancing and acrobatic act. Messrs. Short and Edwards will discourse sweet music and the Simile trio (late of Ringling Bros.) will present their great comedy farce act. In addition there will be an animal act, particulars of which will be published later, four balloon ascensions and parachute jumps; Scotch dances, sword dances, Highland fling, etc., by the Scottish bagpipers, and plenty of good music by three or more excellent bands.

The racing program will be very strong and there is to be a steeplechase with a bush and water jump thrown in. There will also be a parade by the freemen of Western Canada, who will hold their annual convention during the fair and the Knights of Pythias will also have a parade in full regalia.

Strathcona day will be a big day. The citizens of the University city are very enthusiastic about the exhibition and are giving it much valued support.

SETTLER SUICIDES.

Old Timer of Content District Found Dead in a Shed.

Lacombe, June 2.—Frank Graham, a well known and highly respected settler of the Lacombe district, committed suicide at his ranch near Content.
Mr. Graham had been in very bad health for some time, and it is the opinion of his friends that his mind had become unbalanced by the suffering he had undergone from some lung trouble. He was found in a shed near his house, and it was thought that he had committed suicide by hanging himself. His wife was sure he had gone either to Lacombe or to the hospital, and was taking an inquiry was made at the station and it was learned that he had not boarded the train at Nevis. A search of the records of the Nevis station showed that he had boarded the train at Nevis, and it was found that he had been found with a bullet wound in his head, and a revolver lying beside him.
The late Mr. Graham was about forty-seven years of age, and located in the Lacombe district, some miles from Nevis. He leaves a wife and nine children.

WINNIPEG MURDER CASE.

Two Gallians Charged with Killing Another.

Winnipeg, June 2.—Before Magistrate McMahon, Mike Pihlman and Nikola Romani appeared for preliminary hearing on the charge of murdering a companion. All parties concerned were Galicians. Mike Hawk was found dead March 2nd in the bush near Sandilands. The third accused, Mike Galanek, was charged with having killed Hawk.
