Fads and Fashions.
Shadow effects are much in evidence in veils. The patterns must not be obtrusive, though occurring at irregular distances and perhaps twice in one length.
On afternoon and evening gowns the tulle is of chiffon-cloth, metal gauze or lace, ending above the knees and trimmed with roses or fur or embroidery.
Hair ornaments are very wide, giving the effect of little turbans. Tapering, brocades, white suede, black satin and metallic tissues, studded with beads, are used.
Bugles and jet, which have always been associated in our minds with elegantly-gowned old ladies, are now seen ornamenting flippant evening frocks and youthful coiffures.
On the midseason gowns, as well as on those we have been wearing, the tulle plays an important part. It is seen on evening gowns, as well as on those for the street.
Velvet bags are framed in gold or silver. They are variously shaped, but all are suspended from the arm by heavy silken cords and tassels. Some are elaborately beaded.
Tailored frocks of satin are the rage, and no more satisfactory although somewhat expensive, tailored frock could be devised for spring than one of smooth, firm satin.
The opalescent-blowse is one of the newest and best of the season's fashions. Chiffon, gauze, marquisette and silk muslin are the materials used to develop an opalescent blowse.
The touch of red so dominant in the winter's fashions has spread to the artificial flower, and the deep, tone of the old-fashioned fuschia now adds warmth to a corsage bouquet of violets.
Very elaborate are the veils of chiffon in exquisitely shaded colors. On the centre part of American beauty red, which shades imperceptibly into the most delicate pink of the sides.
For cold weather, or for motoring there are knitted veils of Shetland wool. These nestles are fine and plain, and the comfort surprising. These are new and are being worn by many women.
Tunics of figured foulard over skirts of plain satin—black and white foulard, for instance, over a black satin skirt—are very smart. They are trimmed with odd bands and tails of the material.
Black mousseline de soie, trimmed with Irish, Brussels or Venise lace or with black Chantilly, is effective and fashionable. If color is wanted gold or silver embroidery furnishes often just the right touch.
New frocks of batiste or fine linen instead of being deliciously embroidered and trimmed with lace insertions are tucked throughout—half-included tucks—and are trimmed with bands of English embroidery.
The vogue for velvet is, if anything, on the increase. We have had the velvet scarf, the hand-bag of velvet, the velvet shoe and slipper and the velvet parasol, fan and muff, and new ways of using velvet are invented daily.
Borders are one of the chief characteristics of many of the new cotton materials, and are charmingly exploited on the striped and dotted French swisses, cotton voiles and marquisettes, French tulle, mousselines and pongettes.
Shoes may be had to match almost any costume for the street, and as for evening wear, the shoes of satin, velvet and brocade, the slippers of gold and silver, satin, embroidery and lace with the most fascinating buckles and bows, are a delight.
Fleche effects are very graceful, especially when the materials are light and transparent. There are charming "V" and surplice patterns
