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

Niobe Enquiry. Deputy Minister Says He Has No Evidence to Blame Officers.

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—Deputy Minister DeBarats issued a further statement this afternoon in which he characterized as false stories said to have emanated from Halifax, one to the effect that Commander McDonald of the Niobe had surrendered his sword to Admiral Kingsmill, and the other that officers of the Niobe had been to a ball in Yarmouth.

Commander McDonald left his sword behind him it was because he found it inconvenient to carry it, said the deputy.

An enquiry into the accident is being conducted, but pending its outcome there will be no action against anyone. "I have yet to receive evidence that any officers of the Niobe were to blame."

Five Men Drowned in Fraser River.

Hope, B.C., Aug. 12.—Five men, names at present unknown, were drowned in the Fraser river at Saddle Rock, the first snag station above Yale. They were part of a gang attempting to place a cable across the river. The five were in a small boat and were swimming by the current.

This makes a total of nine men drowned since the beginning of preparations for railway construction from Hope northwards.

Three Drowned in Mississippi Lake.

Carlton Place, Ont., Aug. 14.—Three persons were drowned last evening in Mississippi Lake, three miles above here. The victims are: Miss Belle Richards, daughter of Mr. Jas. Richards of the C. P. R. shop here.

Miss Annie Ellison, daughter of Mr. Tom Ellison of Carleton Place. Rudolph Joerg, son of Martin Joerg of Condorsport, Pa.

Both girls were about 18 years of age and were much beloved by the people of their town. Mr. Joerg was a young electrician who came here recently to visit friends. The accident occurred through the swamping of a canoe in which the young people were returning to town, towed by a motor launch.

Peers in Receipt of Salaries.

Interesting List Supplied in British House of Commons.

London, Aug. 16.—Mr. Lloyd George has furnished a list of those members of the British House of Lords who are in receipt of salaries or pensions out of public funds.

Under the head of salaries are included those of various Cabinet, judicial and Household offices which are given in ordinary books of reference. The Duke of Argyll receives a salary of £1,100 as Governor of Windsor Castle, the Bishop of Oxford £101 6s. as Chancellor of the Order of the Garter, the Bishop of Ripon £7 as Clerk of the Closet, Lord Mansfield £250 as Father of the Order of the Thistle, and the Duke of Hamilton £45 10s. as Hereditary Keeper of Holyrood Palace. Eleven peers receive army pay and allowances.

Under the head of pensioners, Lord Knollys receives £1,500 a year, and Lord Suffield and Lord Stansfield £250 a year. Six peers draw pensions amounting altogether to £16,000 for naval and military services. The political pensions are:—Lord Cross £2,000, and Lord Balfour £1,200. Six peers draw naval pensions, and 22 draw military pensions. Twelve peers have pensions for civil services.

Believe Murder Has Been Committed. WEYMOUTH, Aug. 14.—A gruesome discovery was made on the beach at Belliveau Cove on Saturday. Some persons who were passing along the shore discovered the nude body of a man, the body which had evidently been in the water for some time was badly decomposed. The head was missing also the feet and hands.

It is believed that the man was the victim of foul play, as the physicians who examined the body made a startling discovery. The collar bone was broken and there was a bullet wound in the back under the shoulder blade, evidently made by a shot from a 22 calibre revolver.

It is thought that the victim was about 35 or 40 years of age. He was about five feet eight inches in height and his plan 28 adopted, he weighed 175 pounds.

The theory held here is that the man met his death in a fight on some vessel, and after he had been killed the body was thrown into the sea.

The mystery will be a difficult one to solve. It is stated that about three weeks ago a man answering the description of the victim, left Weymouth on a vessel. The Coroner's Jury held an inquest and returned a verdict that the deceased met his death at the hands of parties unknown. The body has been interred.

FISHERY DESERTER.—A man who is accused of having deserted from the fishery was arrested last night under a warrant.

THE STRIKE SETTLER. Thanks to the efforts of Mr. G. R. Askwith, whose great services in the settlement of labour disputes have earned for him the name of the "Industrial Peace-maker," the trouble in the shipping world was brought to a speedy conclusion that at first seemed impossible.

Among the triumphs of Mr. Askwith's career as arbitrator, which has covered nearly a hundred disputes, must be counted the settlement of the cotton disputes in the autumn of last year, of the strike in Belfast, when the troops were compelled to fire on the crowds, and of the great dispute between the railway companies and their employees which nearly led to a general strike.

A particularly difficult task was the settlement of the music-hall strike, and when the bootmakers of the Ramo made their historic march upon the War Office it was Mr. Askwith who was selected by the Army Council to deal with them. As a result of his decision, he was made permanent arbitrator of the district boot trade.


