There is considerable elation in the Allies' line over the capture of five German aeroplanes by a French cavalry patrol.

Twenty cavalymen, patrolling into a thickly wooded country entered a clearing where the rich prize awaited them. The aviators and a number of mechanics at the time were engaged in overhauling five Taube aeroplanes. The patrol made a dash to round up the loot, but met with fierce resistance and twelve cavalymen were killed before the aeroplanes were beaten. Their aeroplanes will never fly again.

## A Battle.

A battle is a wholesome case of justifiable homicide.

When one man kills another in a private quarrel he is hanged unless the crime occurred in this country, in which case he gets anywhere from a slap on the wrist to several years in prison.

But when a man takes a rapid fire gun and shoots the vital up-holstering out of a hundred husbands and fathers in a battle he is promoted and gets a medal.

This is because it is patriotic and gallant to fight in battles and will be until nations have as much sense as individuals.

Man has been fighting battles ever since he was invented. But methods have changed a good deal. Five thousand years ago a warrior fitted a hearse around a large stone and bashed in the heads of his enemies. Later on the sword was invented and thousands of men backed away at each other on the battlefield from sun-up until supper time, throwing the ground with arms, legs, ears and noses, which remained uncalled for after hostilities had ceased. Those were the days when a broad-shouldered man who could do a half-lawford or back-bone stroke with a twelve-pound sword hewed great holes in the enemies' ranks and became king, because nobody could object. The king business was conducted strictly on its merits in those times, and when a king got out of practice with his cutting tools he went into a sarcophagus in short order.

When gunpowder was invented all this was changed because a thin little man, with no ancestors, could shoot a hole in a perfectly good king with no effort at all. After this kings stayed in the background and made suggestions, while the common soldier shot each other into messy remains with rifles, mortars, cannon bombs, torpedoes, revolvers and Gatling guns.

Fifty years ago a battle was a grand sight and sound, but times have changed. A rifle now shoots two miles and a soldier lies all day in a ditch shooting into the invisible beyond, over a hill. At night a book-keeper checks him off and if there are enough soldiers alive to keep on firing a great victory has been won.

Battles are now fought over mines and under airships with machine guns which can mow down a forest, and after a couple of good, hard scraps a nation has to suspend hostilities until it can grow a new crop of soldiers. This is a good thing, because battles will have to be used in their place in settling international disputes.

Household Notes

Cold water soothes the pain of any sudden inflammation of the eye.

Rust can be removed by boiling the garment in cream of tartar water.

The paraffin paper which lines boxes is good to polish flatirons on.

Fill halved peaches with whipped cream and cover with grated macaroni.

If an iron is allowed to get red hot it will never retain the heat as well again.

If one or two green nasturtium seed pods are put in the catsup, it will not mould.

Begin at the root of an onion, peeling it upward. The juice will not fly in your eyes.

Never dust a silk hat with a brush, but wipe the dust off with a piece of velvet.

When watering house plants, a little sweet milk added will often be a benefit to them.

Dried lemon peel sprinkled over the coals will destroy any disagreeable odor in the house.

Do not allow ashes to collect in the ashpan; they will cause the grate to burn out quickly.

Rub the zinc-covered kitchen table with a cloth dipped in vinegar. It will keep it bright.

Painted woodwork can be satisfactorily washed by dissolving baking soda in war water.

Put a pair of old gloves in the shoe box to keep the hands clean when polishing shoes.

The color of kid shoes can be restored by a mixture of good black ink and the white of an egg.

Cayenne pepper sprinkled on every shelf and in every crevice is said to drive mice away.

When frying oysters, try adding a little baking powder to the crumbs in which they are rolled.

A pumice stone will remove any discoloration or burnet or scorched spot on cooking utensils.

The water in which unsalted rice has been boiled makes an excellent starch for lingerie waists.

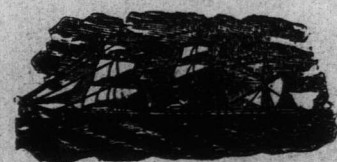

## PROCLAMATION!

By His Excellency SIR WALTER

EDWARD DAVIDSON, Knight

Commander of the Most Distinguished

Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

Whereas the British Empire is now at War with Germany and Austria; and whereas, after consultation with the Heads of the various Religious Denominations in this Colony I deem it meet and proper, and in keeping with the desire of our people, that a special date be set apart as a day of Universal Prayer and Supplication to Almighty God for the protection of the British Empire and the success of the British Arms and Allied Forces, and for the blessings of an honourable and lasting Peace;

And whereas I have ascertained from the Heads of the various Religious Denominations in this Colony that Sunday, the Eighteenth day of October next, would be a convenient day for such public prayers:

Wherefore I, the Governor, do hereby appoint and direct that Sunday, the Eighteenth day of October next, be observed throughout this Colony as a day of Universal Prayer and Supplication to Almighty God for the protection of the British Empire and for the success of the British Arms and Allied Forces, and for the blessings of an honourable and lasting Peace;

And whereas notice of this appointment may not be received in some of the remote settlements of the Colony before the said Eighteenth day of October:

Therefore I do further direct that in such cases such public devotions be observed on some other convenient day as early as possible after the receipt of this Proclamation as the various Clergy having jurisdiction in these remote settlements may respectively appoint.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at the Government House, St. John's, this 29th day of September, A.D. 1914.
