Outside the sinking of three steam- ϵ rs with 150 lives lost, the only ϵ vents of importance in the news received during the day, were the renewal of activities by the Russian Black Sea fleet which bombarded the forts on the Bosphorus, the announcement from Petrograd that the Baltic Sea fleet has been reinforced by modern ighting units, presumably dreadnoughts which were built in Russian yards. Battles for the Carpathian passes are proceeding with ever in-creasing violence. The Russians are in complete possession of the West-ern Passes and are advancing into in complete possession of the Western Passes and are advancing into
