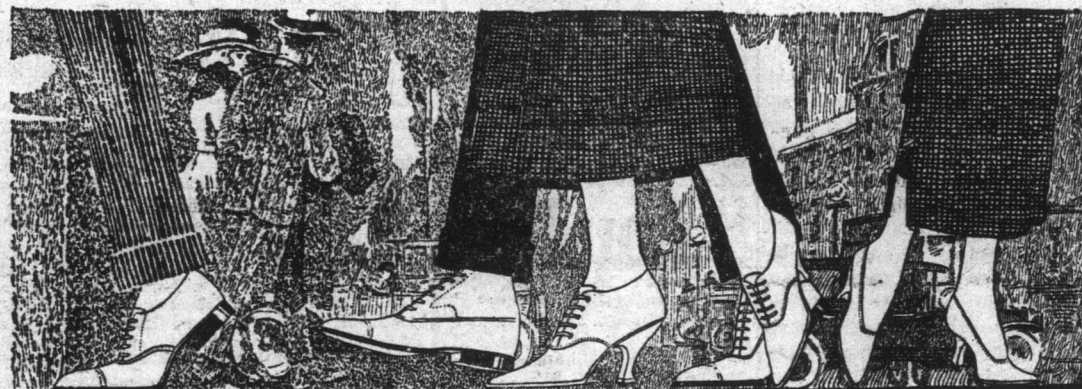

Bolshevism Well Rooted IN THE UNITED STATES.

Law-abiding citizens were startled here a few days ago that a real hot-bed of Bolshevism was unrolled in a small East Side tenement New York City. But that was only an instance. "Are you aware," says the Magazine, "that two or three hundred Soviets have already been organized in the United States? Did you have any idea that an average ten anarchist meetings are held every night of the week? Is it not true to you that the anarchists have organized a school for teaching their principles to children right in our midst? Did it ever occur to you that a host of radical organizations, the I. W. O. type, are nothing but fronts of the Bolshevistic and anarchist societies now so actively active throughout the United States? Did you ever suspect that there are thousands upon thousands of revolutionaries who are daily and nightly plotting and plotting to set a torch to this country as soon as their leaders decide that the moment for action has arrived? All this is not unfounded feverish twaddle. It is founded on concrete, detailed information gathered by responsible investigators. The Government has all these facts. The Government has learned, too, that very large sums have come from Russia to spread Bolshevism here—the

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cent order forbidding financial transactions with Russians has come rather late in the day. American Bolsheviks are making converts every day. Here is a significant incident: A prominent newspaper sent six of its best reporters to New York City to investigate the whole Bolshevistic and anarchist movement going on under the surface. At the end of a month two of them had been won over by the Bolsheviks; they resigned and we are now Bolsheviks.

While there is no occasion for us to lose our heads, yet it is tremendously important that the facts should be revealed and both concerted and individual efforts made to combat the poisonous movement. Shutting our eyes to the danger will not cure it. Each of us can do a little to counteract the propaganda. If we find that your barber or your janitor or your elevator operator or your bookkeeper or any of your workers or associates have misconceptions concerning what Bolshevism really is, it will be worth while to take the time to explain matters. Bolshevism feeds on ignorance

and discontent. Education and publicity, combined with the removal of causes of discontent, can best slay it. Lloyd George gravely declared the other day, "Civilization, unless we try to save it, may be precipitated and shattered to atoms." That sounds in the highest degree panicky, coming from the lips of the Prime Minister of Great Britain. It must be assumed, however, that he knows more of the actual conditions than we do.

Let us have confidence, courage optimism and all the rest; but don't let us live in a fool's paradise. Let's spread enlightenment.

Enemy Dukes

STRUCK OFF THE PEERAGE.

The London Gazette of March 28 announces the removal from the British Peerage of:

H. R. H. Leopold Charles, Duke of Albany, Earl Clarence, and Baron Arklow.

H. R. H. Ernest Augustus, Duke of Cumberland and Teviotdale, Earl of Argyll.

H. R. H. Ernest Augustus, the Duke of Brunswick, Prince of Great Britain, and Ireland; and

Henry Viscount Daafoe of Correen and Baron of Ballymote.

The Order in Council recalls that under the Titles Deprivation Act, 1917, the King in November last appointed a Privy Council Committee to report the names of any persons enjoying any dignity or title as a Peer or British Prince who had during the war borne arms against Great Britain or her Allies or had been adherent to the King's enemies.

The committee comprised the Lord Chancellor and Lords Lansdowne, Crewe, Newton, Stanthorpe, and Sumner, and the Lord Chamberlain. It reported that the Dukes of Albany, Cumberland and Brunswick and Viscount Taafoe had adhered to the King's enemies during the present war.

"The King accepts the report," says the announcement, "and gives orders to the Garter King of Arms, and others concerned to act accordingly."

The Duke of Albany is the only son of the late Duke of Albany, who was the youngest son of Queen Victoria. He was born to the title on November 19, 1884, his father having died in the previous March, and after the death of his uncle, the Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha (Duke of Edinburgh), in 1900, he succeeded to that dukedom, which he abdicated after the German revolution.

Early in the war he renounced his colonelcy-in-chief of the Seaforth Highlanders, accusing them of "a disgraceful attack on Germany." Later he signed a law excluding his British relations from any right of succession to his Throne.

"Quite a German."

The Duke of Cumberland is a great-grandson of George III. His father reigned as King of Hanover from 1851 to 1866, when the Prussian Government deprived him of his throne and annexed his territory. Born in 1845, he succeeded as third duke in 1878.

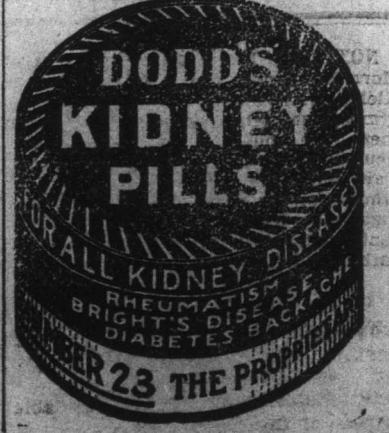
Early in the war he was "I feel myself quite a German, and hope the war will end victoriously for the Central Powers."

The Duke of Brunswick is the Duke of Cumberland's son. He became reigning Duke of Brunswick-Laneburg in November 1913, and renounced the throne for himself and his heirs in November last. He married the only daughter of the ex-Kaiser.

Viscount Taafoe is the twelfth holder of an Irish Peerage which dates from 1842. He is a cousin of the Holy Roman Empire, and his family have been famous in Austria for over 200 years. Being an Irish Peer, he had no seat in the House of Lords, but his grandfather's claim to the viscountcy was recognized by that House in 1860.—Daily Mail.
