## To-day's Messages.

LUNCHEON TO ALCOCK AND  
BROWN.

LONDON, June 22.

(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)—

Editor of the Daily Mail presid-

at the luncheon tendered Capt.

Alcock and Lieut. Brown, and there

was a large and distinguished gath-

ing present, including the Ameri-

can Ambassador, the Greek and Ser-

gian Ministers, Col. Winston Church-

ill, Secy. for War, Lord Reading, the

Commissions High Commissioners and

leading officers of the Air Force.

Churchill in presenting a cheque

of \$50,000, from the Daily Mail, and

\$50,000 from other donors said the

achievement was one of the increas-

ing triumphs over nature, and also

showed we still possessed, as a na-

tion, the heroic qualities of bygone

times. It was no disparagement to

Alcock and the United States Navy

to say this flight has a greater signi-

ficance in drawing together the peo-

ple on both sides of the Atlantic.

deep. We are united in one harmon-

ious association of English speaking

He spoke of the interest taken

in the start by the people of St.

John's and then repeated his account

of the flight. Capt. Alcock said that

after the first forty minutes they

only saw the sky for half an hour,

and got very anxious when they had

drop to a very low altitude, but

fortunately saw the sea when at a

hundred feet. During this dive, the

indicator, which had stopped, re-

started working. Subsequently the

control gauge became covered with

oil which he chipped off with his

knife. For several hours he flew,

trying to get above the clouds, and

at 11,000 feet got a glimpse of the

sea at about six o'clock in the morn-

ing. He then descended near the

water and so remained until they

saw land. Lieut. Brown in a modest

speech said the fact that they had

accomplished what they had set out

to do was the greatest satisfaction.

He eulogized the work of the au-

thorities in supplying Meteorological

reports, which however were often

unavoidably late. He detailed the

Meteorological conditions of the

flight and said that at the height

which they flew snow and hail froze

on the airplane.
