Industrial Tie-Up.

Coal Shortage Causes Close Down of Factories--Bolshevik Gains Reported -- Halifax Greets Prince of Wales--Irish Bank Clerks Threaten Strike.

EGYPTIAN AFFAIRS.

CAIRO, EGYPT, Nov. 20. Field Marshal Viscount Allenby, British High Commissioner in Egypt, today paid a visit to the Khedive. The Sultan has as yet made no reply to the Premier regarding the resignation of the Cabinet. Advice from London, November 19th, said the Egyptian Ministry had resigned because of dissatisfaction with the mission approved by Lord Milner, British Secretary for the Colonies, to investigate the unrest in Egypt.

NO IMPROVEMENT IN COAL STRIKE.

CHICAGO, ILL., Nov. 24. Industrial plants all over the mid-West continued to close down today, fuel supplies to public utilities were curtailed further, and regional coal committees advised individuals to save coal as the nation-wide strike of the Bituminous miners' entered its twenty-fourth day. The only large producing center reporting improvement during the last twenty-four hours was West Virginia, where the output in the non-Union fields of the Southern part of the state was said by operators to be normal. In the great Bituminous fields of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois, the miners apparently were determined to remain idle until a settlement of the controversy over wages and hours is reached by the conference at Washington.

BOLSHEVIKS REPORT FURTHER SUCCESSES.

LONDON, Nov. 24. Continued advances against General Denekine and Admiral Kolchak's forces are claimed in the Russian Soviet communique received by wireless today. The Bolsheviks are asserted to

be fast approaching Tsaritsyn, on the lower Volga.

WILL CONTINUE TO AID AUSTRIA.

PARIS, Nov. 24. The decision to maintain aid for Dec. 31 Allied co-operation in retreating Austria was reached yesterday by the supreme economic council. Italy's representative declared that country was ready to aid immediately after the conclusion of a financial agreement.

FINAL SIGNATURE MAY BE DEFERRED.

PARIS, Nov. 24. The departure of Herr Von Simson, German plenipotentiary, who was sent to Paris in connection with the protocol to the Peace Treaty, will likely delay final signatures until December 1 and will also delay the enforcement of the treaty, according to the Presse de Paris.

THREE DEAD IN FIGHT WITH POLICE.

BOGALUSA, La., Nov. 24. Three men were shot to death and two wounded in a pitched battle at a garage here today in which a small band of men attempted to prevent special police deputies from arresting a negro labor leader suspected of inciting negroes and two white men who had carried shot guns to protect him while parading him down the main street of the city.

PRINCE AT HALIFAX.

HALIFAX, Nov. 24. The Renown, bringing the Prince of Wales from New York to Halifax, arrived in port at eight o'clock this morning. His Royal Highnesses arrival was greeted with a salute of twenty-one guns from the citadel and a tremendous tooting of steamer sirens.

CANADA TRIUMPHS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24. Canada has been elected to a governing body of International Labor office, and her election is regarded here as a remarkable triumph. It came after a struggle which has lasted for several weeks.

THE TIGER RESTING.

PARIS, Nov. 24. Premier Clemenceau has rested at St. Vincent Vendes a small solitary house on the seashore where he hopes to rest and work in solitude, according to the Presse de Paris.

ONLY THEMSELVES TO BLAME.

DUBLIN, Nov. 24. Official notice was given today that no more prisoners will be liberated conditionally or unconditionally for hunger striking and that hunger strikers must themselves be responsible for the consequences of their acts. It was also announced that there would be no further amelioration of prison treatment given any prisoners convicted under the defence of the Realm Act. This notice is regarded very seriously in Irish political circles.

BANK CLERKS TO STRIKE.

DUBLIN, Nov. 24. Bank clerks throughout Ireland will strike on December 1st, unless the directors of the Banks consent to recognize their Union, an action which they have hitherto refused to take. This was decided upon at a conference of the Irish Bank Clerks Union held today. Fifty-six delegates at the meeting voted unanimously in favor of the strike which will affect thirty-seven hundred Bank clerks in Ireland.

ITALY'S NEW FOREIGN MINISTER.

ROME, Nov. 24. Tommaso Tittoni, Italian Foreign Minister, has resigned and Vittorio Scialoja, Minister without portfolio, has been named to succeed him according to the Epoca.

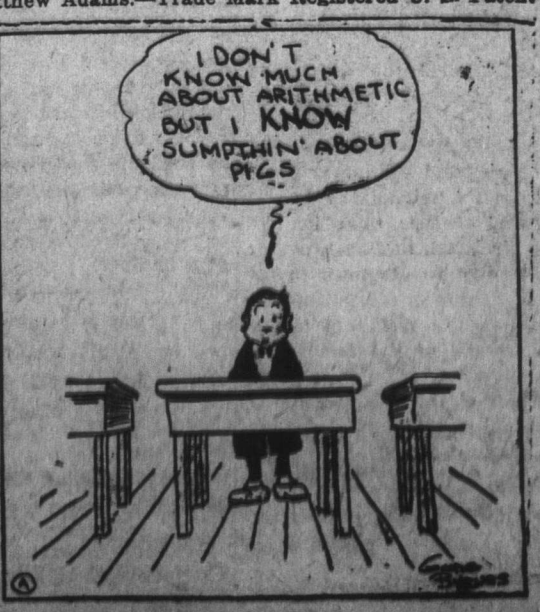
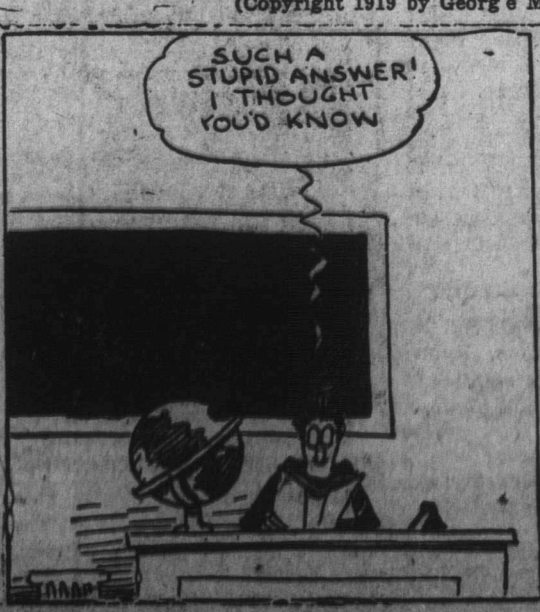
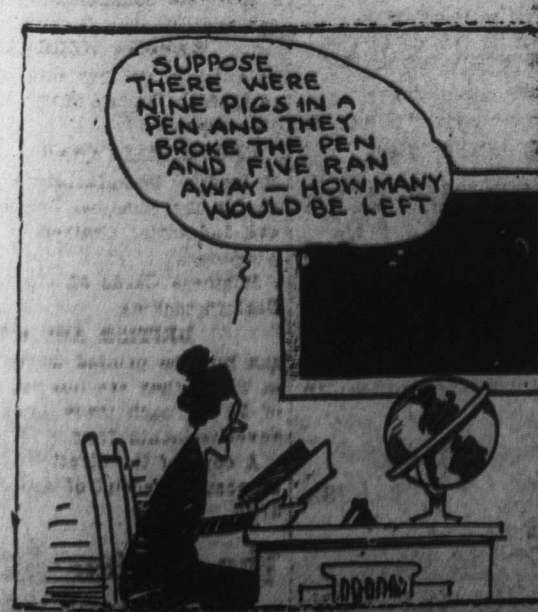
