The Sugar Situation.

The difficulty of casual Governmental interference with established currents of trade is illustrated by the present situation in Canada with regard to sugar. That the last phase of this episode in price control will be a period of high prices is now an assured prospect.

Government control was imposed to keep sugar prices down. Canadian refiners were prevented from exporting to the United States, where high prices prevailed. And now, with control thrown off, the refiners are calling upon Ottawa to prevent the dumping of American sugar, which is now low in price. They argue, quite reasonably, that if authority can be used to cut their profits upon occasion, it can fairly be invoked to keep them from loss arising from the initial applica-

It will be seen that a principle of no little importance is involved in this competition with American industries and the argument which is being put forward now is that the former sho not have to fight with hands tied.

The American consumer went through a short period of high prices and now seems to be in for a long experience of low prices. This pro-cess may be reversed in Canada.
