#### Assassination of Julius Caesar

The greatness of Julius Cæsar, like Gaul, may be divided into three parts. First, he was a great general; second, he was a great statesman; third, he was a great author. There have been men who have excelled him in one or two of these departments, but never one who excelled in all three Cæsar's military genius is hard to parallel. He had all the qualities o great soldier-forethought, decision, rapidity of movement, calmness in the face of danger, and great personal bravery. He was singularly careful of his soldiers, and was idolised by them. Perhaps Wellington and Napoleon approached nearest to him as a soldier. But Cæsar was also a statesman, and as such he belonged to the popular party. He was a good orator, speaking not for show, but to promote reform and better government, and he succeeded in passing a series of laws mainly for the protec tion of the common people against the aristocracy. Our Iron Duke, ever victorious on the battlefield, made but a poor figure in politics. Again, Cæsar was a great man of letters. Most of
