Though Canada will continue to be a technical claimant for its allotted 4.35 per cent. of the total of German reparations payments due to the British Empire, it is understood that the French occupation of the Ruhr region, the Canadian authorities immediately in charge of the reparations matter have abandoned all hope of receiving anything for years to come, if ever. The effect of the French move will no doubt be to confirm the view that the Dominion should retain the \$20,000,000 worth of sequestrated enemy property in Canada.
