

SPOTTING INDEPENDENCE.—The Canadian delegates to the Episcopal Methodist Church to the General Conference at Brooklyn seem to have forgotten that they were British subjects. The Rev. Dr. Wild is reported in the New York Tribune to have said:—"We would prefer a union with the Church of the United States, rather than with that of England. We boldly accept the Monroe doctrine—America for Americans, both politically and religiously. Applause. We are getting jealous of England's interference with us in Canada. Since 1828 we have been free from foreign control, and the change has been in our favor as a Church."
