

Guelph Township Council.

Met on Monday the 9th, pursuant to adjournment, Jas. Laidlaw, Esq., in the chair. Present: Messrs. Benham, Darby, Hawes, and Sweetnam. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. The Reeve read a communication from Samuel Dixon, stating that he is very desirous of being enabled to do any work to procure a living, and he is now over 72 years of age, and earnestly requesting the Council would allow him some aid for his immediate wants. Mr. Benham was authorized to procure some necessities for his relief. Applications were presented from Messrs. H. J. Sanders and Geo. D. Portar to be re-appointed to the office of Assessors. The Collector was present and submitted a satisfactory statement of all monies collected by him, and showing the names of a few defaulters for small sums, the greatest portion being against parties who have left the township; Mr. Harland is again an applicant for the office of Collector. Moved by Mr. Darby, seconded by Mr. Hawes, that the statement of the Collector, showing the collection of all taxes excepting \$3.44, be received, and that the said amount of \$3.44 be struck off the roll.—Carried. Mr. Sweetnam in accordance with notice at last meeting introduced by-law No. 73 for appointing certain township officers, viz., Assessors, Collectors, and Tavern Inspectors. Said by-law went through the regular reading, appointing Messrs. H. J. Sanders and Geo. D. Portar, Assessors; Mr. L. Harland, Collector; and Messrs. Wm. Paterson, West End, and Wm. Patterson in Division G, Tavern Inspectors. Mr. Sweetnam introduced by-law No. 73 for re-nominating certain township officers. The blanks were filled with the following names and the by-law passed:—The Collector to be allowed 10 per cent for all monies collected on behalf of the Council; Assessors, \$70 each; Auditors, \$8 each; Inspectors, \$10 each; Treasurer, \$100; Clerk, \$180; Surveyor, \$6 per day when employed by Council. The petitions presented at last meeting of Council for allowing farmers and others who have need of dogs to be exempt from the tax, or to abolish the tax, were taken into consideration. No action taken. The Reeve read a petition from Edward Hammond and others, desiring a change of Pathmaster for that portion of road between the 6th Con. of Division D, and the 1st Con. of Division B. To his order the Pathmaster was appointed. Mr. Sweetnam, with leave given, introduced by-law No. 74. Said by-law went through the regular readings, and is for the purpose of procuring \$11,000 of the amount placed to the credit of this Corporation by the Municipal Loan Fund Act, and to be appropriated for the redemption of debentures held against the township for the construction of the Galt and Guelph Railway, as certain debentures purchased on that account will not be matured for some time. The Clerk was instructed to transmit a copy of the by-law to the Hon. Peter Gow, M.P., requesting him to present it to the proper department on behalf of the Corporation. The Clerk presented a circular with blank forms of applications from the Ontario Department of Emigration. No action taken. The following accounts were presented and ordered to be paid:—From Wm. Paterson, for gravel, \$5; from James Innes, for printing, \$5.35 being for advertising for tenders for Pipe's Bridge, and half to be charged to the Town Council. Moved by Mr. Sweetnam, seconded by Mr. Benham, that the Assessors assess Divisions A, E, F, and G, in company, and that Mr. Sanders assess the east side of the township as far as the line between the 3rd and 4th Concessions of Divisions D, and Mr. Portar the west side to the same line. The Inspectors were present and submitted the following report:—

To the Reeve and Council of the Township of Guelph:—
GENTLEMEN,—Your Tavern Inspectors, in presenting to you their annual report, have much pleasure in congratulating your honorable body on the decrease of the drinking system in this municipality during the past year. The certificate to obtain a license for the Brick Tavern had not been presented, consequently no license was granted during the year. Secondly, Mr. Cummins found it more profitable some four or five months ago to shut up his tavern; and thirdly, the new inn on the Waterloo Road has been closed for some time. The persons who had the license for it, not finding support to warrant him remaining any longer. And fourthly, Wm. Rheinhardt, who occupies the West End Inn, has signified his intention of not applying for a license this year, thus reducing the taverns of the township from nine to five. Our visits through the taverns during the year have been satisfactory, finding them clean and comfortable, with the necessary accommodation for travellers. All of which is respectfully submitted.

It was then moved and seconded to adjourn until Monday the 23rd inst., when certificates will be granted to obtain tavern licenses to applicants having the required recommendations.

Kindness to Animals.
From the time the colt is born, he should be taught to regard man, whom he is afterward to serve, as his protector and friend. A human hand should first lift him gently to his feet, and direct his little mouth to the source of maternal nourishment. With the human touch he should thus early be made to associate caresses and the supply of all his wants. Instead of oaths and yell and kicks and rule blows, he should hear only gentle, loving tones from the attendant's mouth, and pettings from his kindly palm. He should be taught to expect and watch for man's entrance to the stall or paddock where he is kept, as the dog waits for the coming of the master, as the season of joy and happiness. His little deers-like limbs should be handled, and he taught to yield them promptly and without fear to the master's touch. In short, everything that loving ingenuity can devise should be done to impress upon his mind thus early in life that man is his natural protector and friend, between whom and him an intimate companionship has been ordained by beneficent nature, which insures that he shall be protected and cherished while he serves. The horse has a heart-claim upon us. The young colt is, in some sense, a member of the family, one of the owner's household, second in rank and dignity only to the children. So the Arab regards him. The beautiful young thing, with its shining coat and gazing eyes and sprightly antics, so full of bounding, but docile life, is literally his children's playmate. He shares their food, and often their sleeping quarters; and a blow dealt him is as promptly resented as if it had been dealt the oldest son, for whose service in peace, and safety in the hour of battle, the young thing is being raised.—From 'The Perfect Horse.'
