Mr. L. O. Armstrong, the chief colonization agent and one of the busiest officials of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company who has been at the convention, will give illustrated lectures every night. His views on the grounds "Round the World in 80 Days" is his subject. He shows the advantage to the farmer of being on the shortest line around the globe, via, that it gives him the cheapest freight rates either to Asia or Europe in time of war or famine in either country. Just now the Aliberian farmer is benefiting by the Japanese war. The lecturer demonstrates very clearly that the Canadian farmer is at least as well off as any other today. He says wheat is worth 75 cents anywhere in the Canadian West if fed to cattle or hogs, because one bushel of wheat is worth for feed nearly as much as two bushels of corn.

Mr. Armstrong was enthusiastic about the future of Algoma, and he has added to his work the colonization of the lower Ontario. He is cordially supported in his work by the Provincial Government. Mr. Armstrong says the valley of the Saskatchewan is the best place for the man with a little money. He cannot or will not work too hard, and that Algoma is a good country for a man with little or no money who cannot do the hard work of clearing land.

The lectures, delivered in a resonant and magnetic voice, and admirably illustrated by lantern slides, were very convincing, and will draw great crowds every night. They constitute in themselves an attraction that the Fair management would do well to perpetuate.
